## Rural rate drops in Pickering Twp.

PICKERING TWP. — It pays to live north; of the third concession Pickering Township. Residents in this rural region of the municipality will enjoy a tax decrease of 1.8 mills in 1968. In 1967, the rate was 85.6 mills. In 1968, it will be 83.8 mills.

In layman's terms, a home-owner in School Area 1 with a house assessed at \$5,000 will pay taxes of \$419. Of this, 55.5% is for schools; 22.7 for county and the balance. the general rate over which the council has control. The part of School Area 1 that lies south of conc. 3 will add 1 mill to its rate.

It's a much more serious story in the urban area of the township and the cost of education has been blamed. For example the mill rate in Bay Ridges is 124.6 mills, compared with 117.7 in 1967, A Bay Ridge's house with an assessment of \$5,000 will be \$623. In 1967, it was \$598.50.

In West Rouge, the rate

is higher still-up to 128.1

Reeve John Williams said he was pleased that the council had been able to keep its spending down to the bare bone. He noted that there had been no increases in mill rates or taxes under the responsibility of council and declared that this result had been possible through the diligent work of each council member.

Councillor Don Kitchen said that council was responsible for some decrease in the public school budget, and told how it had worked with Area 2 Board, which was originally faced with an increase of from 4 to 8 mills. Funds realized from the sale of the Base Line School to the township offset the higher mill rate to some degree.

Reeve Williams observed that this was the smallest increase Area 2 ever presented to council, and said that it did the school board credit.

## Protest Pickering high school budget

Pickering Twp. - It was "under protest" that Pickering Township Council accepted the Pickering District High School rate of 32.6 mills residential and 36.2 commercial.

A copy of the protest resolution will be sent to Education Minister William G. Davis.

The high school rate, on a total township assessment of \$32,417,095. will raise \$1,297,296.43.

The only thing that was achieved, Deputy-Reeve Ron Chatten remarked, by the three municipalities in the High School District

Davis, was the province increasing the revenue paid the school board, thus reducing the rate by two mills. No attempt was made by the school board to reduce its operating

Reeve John Williams said that the three municipalities suggested to the Board that the budget be reduced by some means which would enable the municipalities to incur a 15 per cent increase in the mill rate.
