Requests \$500

STOUFFVILLE — A representative of the Victorian Order of Nurses has expressed a desire to better serve residents of Stouffville and in turn is requesting a grant from council of \$500.

The work of the organization has been commended by councillor, Mrs. Ethel Mole.

During 1967, the V.O.N. made 13 visits to Stouffville but it was felt that requests for the service would be increased if more persons were aware of its availability. In the Townships of Markham and Vaughan, visits last year numbered over 500.

Nurses are on call 24 hours a day. The V.O.N. is a non-profit organization, dependent mainly on municipal grants and donations. Forty per cent of calls are free although patients are expected to pay where financially able. After the first call, a nurse will work through the family physician.

The V.O.N. spokesman said that it was the desire of the organization to eventually service all of York County. The office is located in Richmond Hill.

A recommendation on the amount of the grant will be submitted by the finance chairman, councillor Jim McKellar.

Mr. Rooth said that the barking of the dogs interrupted their conversations and depreciated the value of their property.


Council agreed to discuss the problem with the township solicitor and arrive at a solution.

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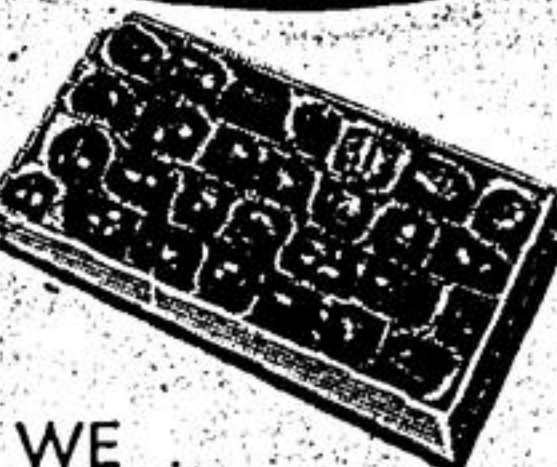
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
