DRUGS AND DRIVING
 Got a cold? Be careful. The remedy you take for it could cost your life unless you use some precaution.
 Medical and police authorities are beginning to suspect a well-known component of cold and hay fever remedies — antihistamine — as the hidden cause of accidents where the driver suddenly is overcome by drowsiness and falters or falls asleep at the wheel.
 Antihistamine, another common drug found in cough mixtures, has a generally depressive effect, since its job is to act as a sedative for cough irritations. Used beyond recommended doses, it dangerously reduces the general awareness of drivers in situations where they must be keenly alert.
 Authorities studying the subject have come up with an interesting sidelight on alcohol. Instead of sobering a subject, a cup of coffee is almost as bad as another drink. The coffee enters the stomach and causes alcohol there to empty into the blood stream more rapidly, increasing intoxication.
 Drug researchers stress that drivers should never exceed recommended dosages of cold and hay fever remedies or any pain killer. And if they continue to feel drowsiness and blurred vision following their use, they should consult a doctor.
 One final thing to bear in mind is that accidents occurring where the influence of drugs can be proven may well lead to a police charge. Today's new cars are silk-smooth, powerful and beautiful. With a little common sense caution we can all stay alive to enjoy them.

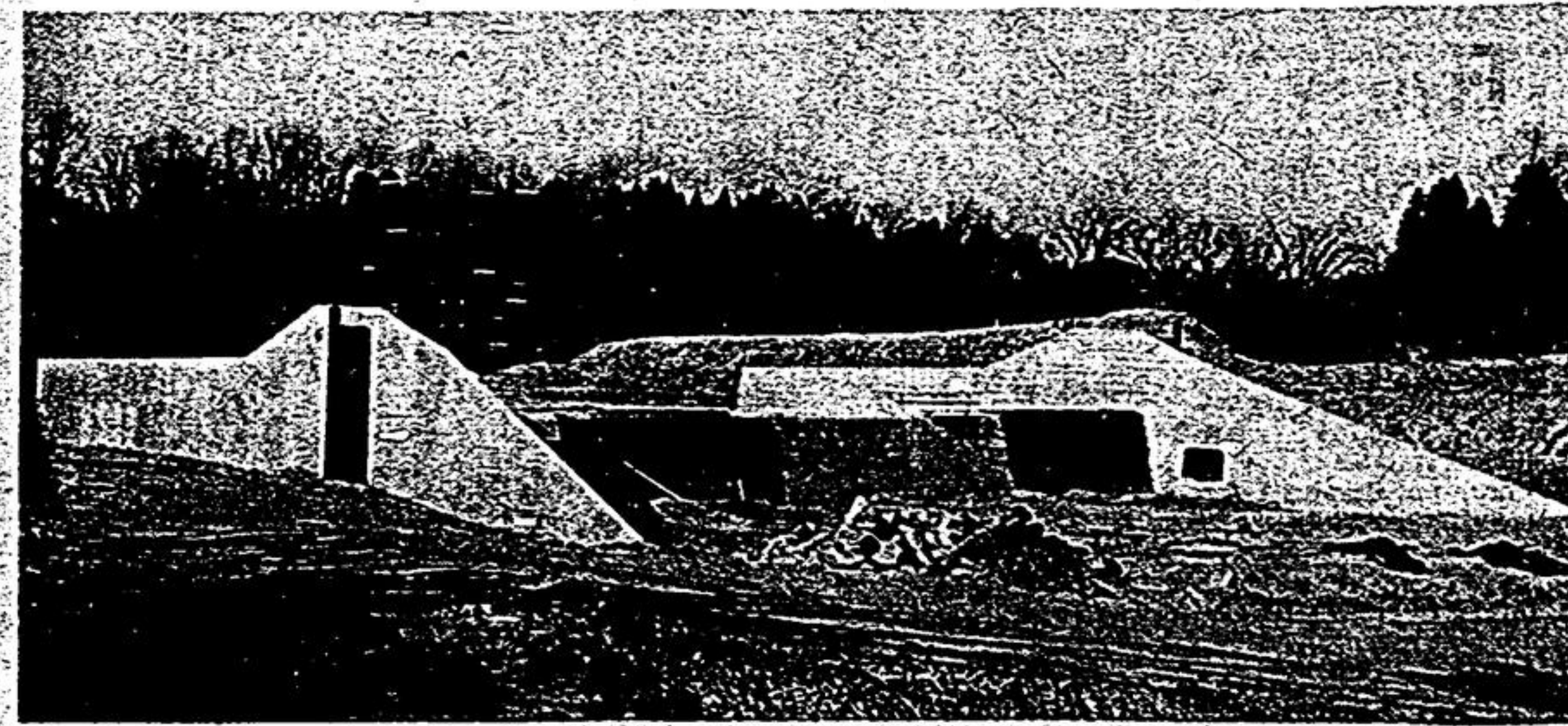
