In the field of Education... Wallace McCutcheon was a member of the Bladen Commission on the Costs of Higher Education. He serves on the Board of Governors of the University of Toronto and St. Francis Xavier University.

During the War he was a "Dollar a Year Man" at Ottawa from 1941-46 and became Deputy Chairman of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. He was awarded the C.B.E. for his services.

Business Background:

WALLACE McCUTCHEON has had a successful professional and business career. He has been a practising lawyer and an Associate of the Society of Actuaries. He was assistant to the President of National Life Insurance Company of Canada, and Assistant General Manager. He was vice-president and managing director of the Argus Corporation for 17 years in which capacity he was associated with the development of some of Canada's most important business concerns.

WALLACE McCUTCHEON has owned a farm in York-Simcoe for 19 years and is a permanent resident of the constituency. He has given his time generously to various community activities. He attends Wesley United Church.
