Dumping garbage proves costly
 PICKERING TWP. — W. Haight, R.R. 1, Locust Hill, was fined \$25 and costs on one charge of spreading garbage on Pickering Twp. road allowances and \$25 and costs or five days on a second charge.
 On the east side of Sideline 24/25 between Highway 7 and Concession 5, Municipal Enforcement Officer Robert Craig testified he found 15 garbage bags, chrome chairs and other items spread along the road-side about one-quarter of a mile. This garbage was later removed.
 The second offence occurred on the 5th concession east of the Brock Rd. In each case, Mr. Craig was able to find identification to Mr. Haight, who did not appear in court. Justice of the Peace Wm. Murkar said: “Mr. Haight ought to purchase himself a scow or something!”
 J. Percy, 67 Virginia Avenue, Toronto, also left a considerable amount of garbage in Pickering Twp. on the east side of Rosebank Road between concessions 2 and 3.
 When confronted with this violation, Mr. Percy picked the refuse up.
 “The fact that the garbage has been removed, has no bearing on this,” said Mr. Murkar. He registered a fine of \$25 and costs.
