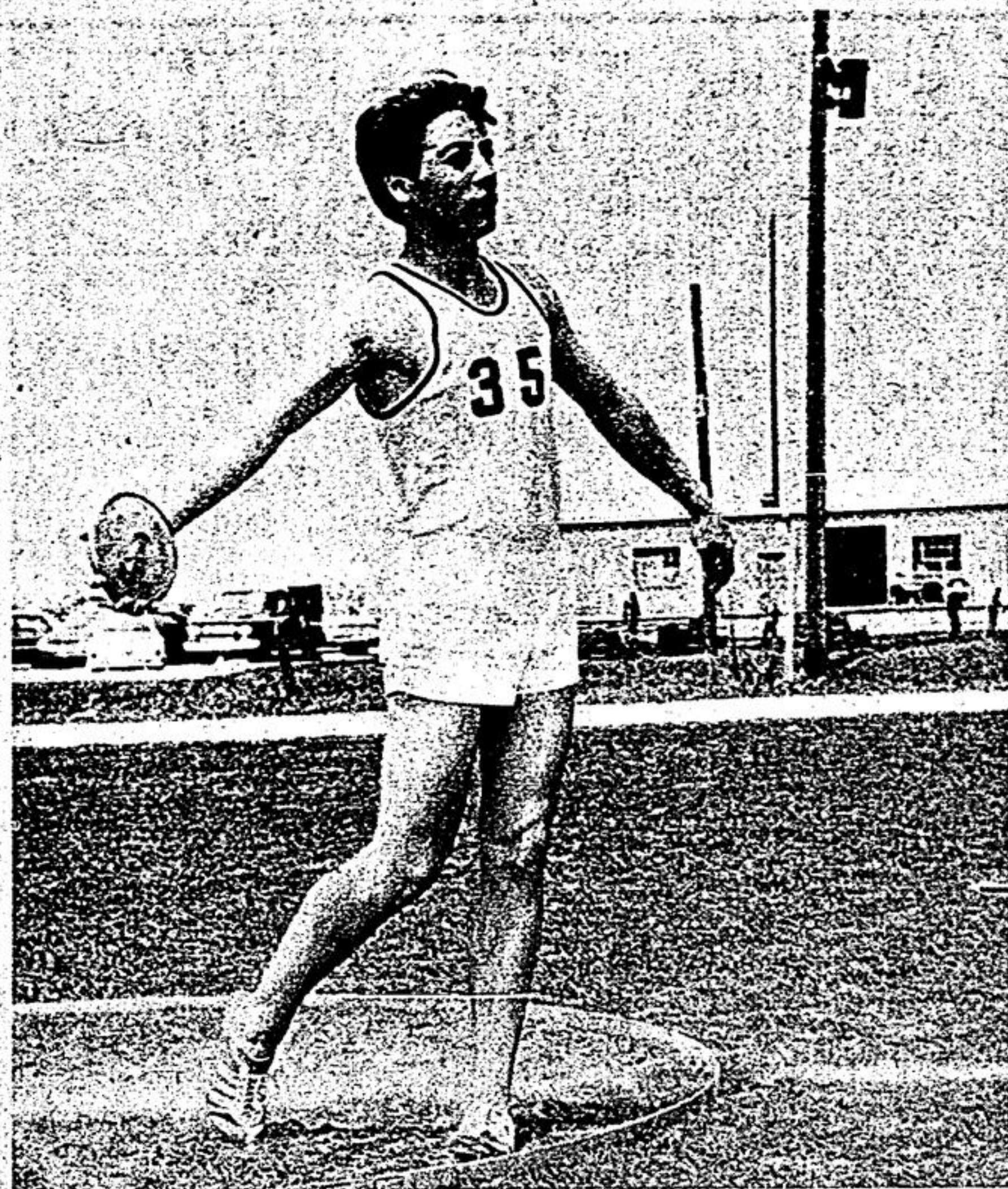

SDSS places second in zone trials at Markham

STOUFFVILLE—Track and field athletes of Stouffville Dist. Secondary School had an outstanding day at the Zone trials May 8 at Markham. They placed second to Markham and ahead of Pickering College, St. Andrew's and Bradford.

In total points, the standings were: Markham, 311; Stouffville, 206; St. Andrew's 186; Pickering College, 167 and Bradford 35.

Some of the highlights at the meet for Stouffville included: The outstanding mile relay (Cliff Bass, Peter Sanderson, Derek Gresham, Andreas Blackwell) won in record time of 3:39.2. The G.B.S.S. record was 3.43. The Stouffville time won't count because it must be done at the G.B.S.S.A. finals.

Derek Gresham placed first in the mile with a time of 4:45.2. He also headed the field in the 880 with a time of 2.11.

Ken Coutts was first in the senior shot at 46 feet five and on-quarter inches and first in the discus at 131 feet, nine and three-quarter inches.

Glen Gibson was first in the junior discus at 122 feet, nine and a half inches.

Larry Speece was first in the junior shot at 42 feet, seven inches.

Andreas Blackwell was first in the Intermediate 440 with a time of 54.3. He placed second in the 880.

Alan Bacon was first in the Intermediate high jump at 5 feet two inches.

Peter Sanderson was first in the Intermediate triple jump at 39 feet 6 inches and second in the Intermediate mile at 4:54.

Former RCMP instructor

Opens riding school

STOUFFVILLE — A former instructor with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Musical Ride, has opened a new equestrian training school, west of Stouffville in Whitchurch Township. He hopes to make it the finest in Ontario.

Ben Ewen feels he knows just about everything about horses, and after 21 years in the "Mounties" he probably does.

His property is located at the corner of concession 7 and the Markham-Whitchurch townline, the former Arthur Paisley farm.

For thirteen years, Ben was an instructor with the Musical Ride, a precision group whose fame is world-wide.

Following his retirement from the force four years ago, he was presented with his own personal horse, now his most prized possession. Mr. Ewen worked with a veterinary office for a period of seven months and opened a riding stable at Bayview Farms, Thornhill. He has provided professional instruction to many young people, many of whom have gone on to win hundreds of ribbons and awards in district shows.

Ben began setting up his new school last December and at present is working on the construction of a 50' x 100' indoor arena.

His main interest is the training of young riders up to the age of 18 but he would be pleased to welcome persons of all ages, girls and boys, men and women.

"I would like to see a club organized in Stouffville," said Mr. Ewen, "where men and their wives can enjoy an evening of relaxation. It's excellent exercise and age is no handicap. All my horses are quiet and easy to handle."

Mr. Ewen is presently preparing for a horse and pony show, May 25 and 26. On Saturday, ponies will participate for ribbons, trophies and cash prizes. Sunday will be a junior horse show. It will be Class "A" competition with some of the best riders in Ontario competing.

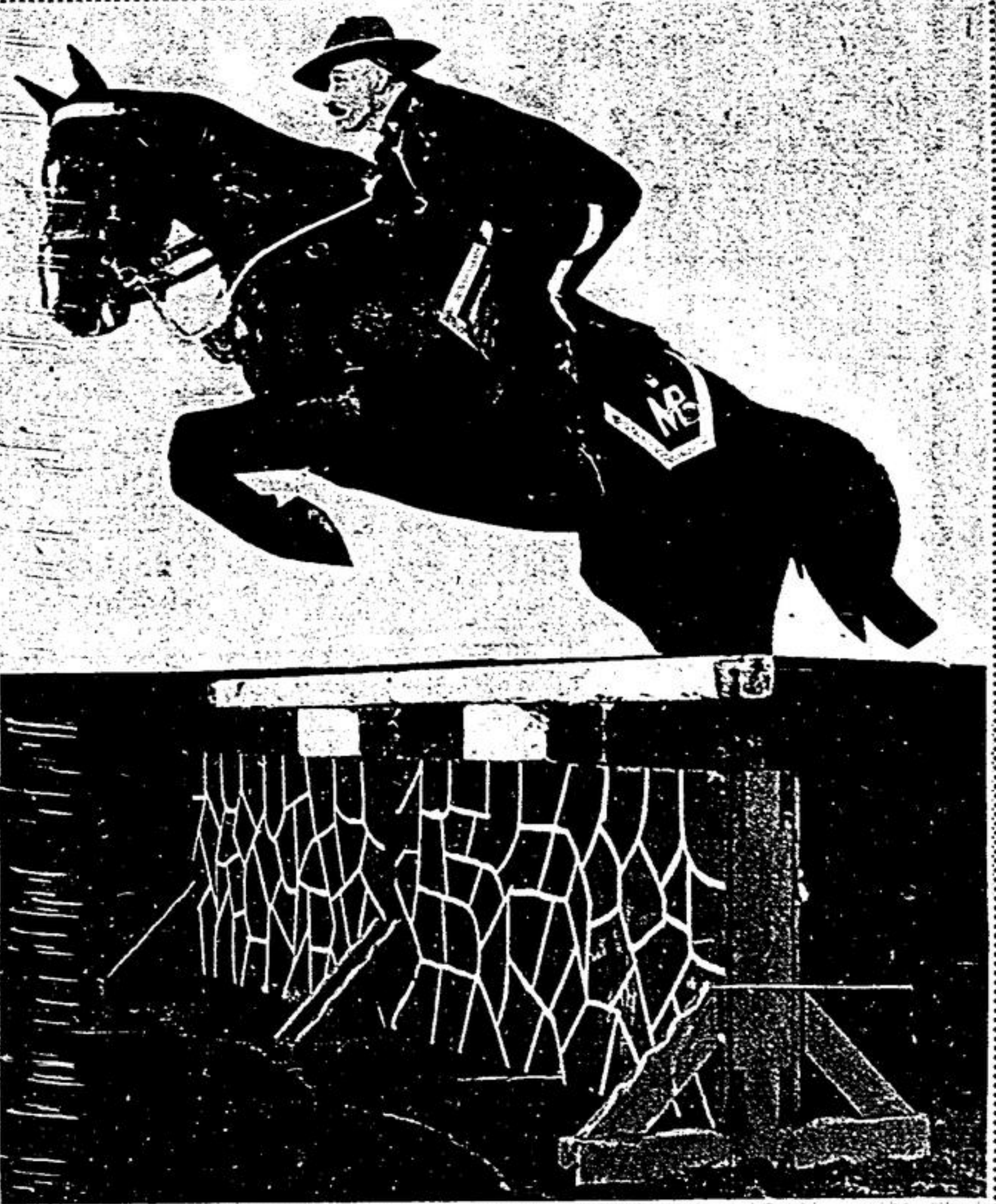

The route of the walk is as follows: from Crosby Arena on Kennedy Rd. at the north end of Unionville, the route will go up north as far as 16th Avenue, west one and one-quarter miles to the fifth concession, north to the town line, east on the town line to the 7th concession, south to 17th Avenue, east to the 8th concession, south from there to No. 7 Highway, west to Unionville, then north on Kennedy Road to the finish point at Crosby Arena. It's 20 miles in all, over both paved and gravel roads.

At intervals along the route there will be check-points where the walkers are checked in as they pass. And on the town line between the 6th and 7th concessions, is a lunch stop where the Youth Centre will provide free drinks and food for the walkers.

The project is being given the full and enthusiastic support of the Ontario Provincial Police, Markham Township Police and the Police of Markham Village. As well as a St. John's Ambulance unit will be on duty with a radio controlled ambulance and ten volunteers ready for any emergency. In addition, the service clubs of the area are supplying cars at any point in

'Walkathon', May 25

UNIONVILLE — The date? May 25! The place? Markham Township! The event? "Walk of Ages!"

On the above date somewhere between 1,000 and 2,000 young people and adults will stage a "walkathon" along twenty miles of Markham Township roads.

The purpose is to raise money for the forthcoming "Union Villa" to

be built in Unionville as a future home for Senior Citizens of Markham Township.

For weeks now, the people who have volunteered to do the walking have been working hard at getting Markham Township citizens to act as their sponsor, that is, to pledge a specific amount of money for each mile they walk. The sponsor agrees,

for instance, to put up twenty-five cents (or any amount they wish) for each mile covered by the walker who has approached them for sponsorship. If they walk ten miles (of the twenty-mile course) they automatically donate \$2.50 (if they have pledged twenty-five cents a mile) to the building of "Union Villa."

The name "Walk of Ages" is a significant one. It identifies the efforts of young people to do their part for older people — Senior Citizens — and a
