INDUSTRIAL SITES

WHITCHURCH TWP.— In an effort to promote industrial development within the Township of Whitchurch, both council and Planning Board members have expressed a desire to acquire properties that could be zoned for industrial use.

The Planning Board has recommended that all land adjacent to the CNR line at Vandorf be marked for future industrial sites and that the owners be asked to deal directly with the council rather than private developers.

Land located in the Bal-

lantra area has also been considered as future sites for industrial expansion. The Board has recommended further that council investigate the price of land bordering on new Highway 404, since like the railroad, industry

could find delivery service by transit a decided benefit.

Deputy Reeve Lawrence Hennessy has suggested that council give the recommendations further consideration in committee.
