What's In A Name? Extend Woodbine Avenue north to Hwy. No. 7

MARKHAM TWP. — Sentiment and logic prevailed at a meeting of Markham Township Council when it came to attaching a permanent nameplate to the conc. 4 section of roadway extending from Steeles Avenue on the south to Gormley on the north.

Councillor Allan Sumner recommended that it be called Woodbine Avenue, the same as the portion within Metro.

Councillor Charles Hoover argued that the name Don Mills should not be dropped entirely. Members settled on a compromise.

The section from Steeles Avenue to Hwy. 7 will be re-named Woodbine Avenue. The section from Hwy. 7 to Gormley will remain as Don Mills Road.

Clerk Harry T. Crisp explained that business firms in the township's industrial area had been numbered according to Woodbine Avenue for water service purposes. Councillor Sumner pointed out that business places were having difficulty explaining their locations and outside firms were experiencing trouble in completing deliveries.

Editor's mail

Broader approach

Dear Sir: Your June 13 issue had a brief editorial regarding the Mennonite concern in providing jobs for the USA draft-dodger.

Your reading audience should be informed that the Mennonite approach to this situation is much broader than implied in your article. Currently steps are being taken to assist such persons in their own country. The Peace Section of the Mennonite Central Committee with headquarters at Akron, Pa. is seeking to find ways and means to counsel such person in the USA regarding existing provision for military exemption. The majority of draft-dodgers in Canada are unaware of such legislation or the steps to be taken in their situation. Others in the USA with similar convictions could benefit greatly from some informed assistants.

A further action has been taken in Canada to help the draft-dodger in our country. Their motives are not always the best. But as a Christian church we need to help these and any other individuals in our society to find freedom of conviction and justice in its expression. Mennonites have a significant history as conscientious objectors to military participation and are in a responsible position to assist persons with similar concerns.

Stouffville U.M. Church contributions \$62,000

STOUFFVILLE — Contributions by the congregation of Stouffville United Missionary Church reached a record high of \$62,395 during the year, the pastor, Rev. Arthur Walsh reported at the annual provincial conference, held at Bethany Church, Kitchener. This is an average of more than \$340 per member.

In the 53 churches throughout Ontario, offerings for all purposes amounted to an all-time high of \$785,000. This is an increase of 15 percent in one year. The average member of the United Missionary Church in Ontario gave \$260.92 as compared with \$240.22 in 1967.

At present, new churches are under construction in New Dundee, Willowdale and Stouffville. Value of church property in Ontario is \$3,250,000. The conference in 1969 will be held at Stouffville.

Rev. Ward M. Shantz, district superintendent, said he was pleased with the progress the church was making. During the past three years, membership has climbed by 16 percent. Sunday School attendance is also up by 1.7 percent in Ontario during the past 12 months.

Five new congregations have been formed — at Pembroke, Richmond Hill, Elmira, West Rouge and South River.

Dr. Kenneth E. Geiger, general superintendent, informed the conference that there were sufficient numbers of ministers to fill all pulpits. Two pastors have been ordained, Rev. Cecil Rosenberger of Paisley and Rev. Lloyd D. Fretz of West Rouge. Five new applicants have stated their calls to the ministry and have been received as ministers on probation — Andrew Jones, Gormley; Roger Stover, Stouffville; Melvin Otterbein, New Dundee; David Atkinson,

have promoted this idea. Interestingly when people enter our country we can directly aid the economy there is no objection if they do take on jobs.
