Markham horse show

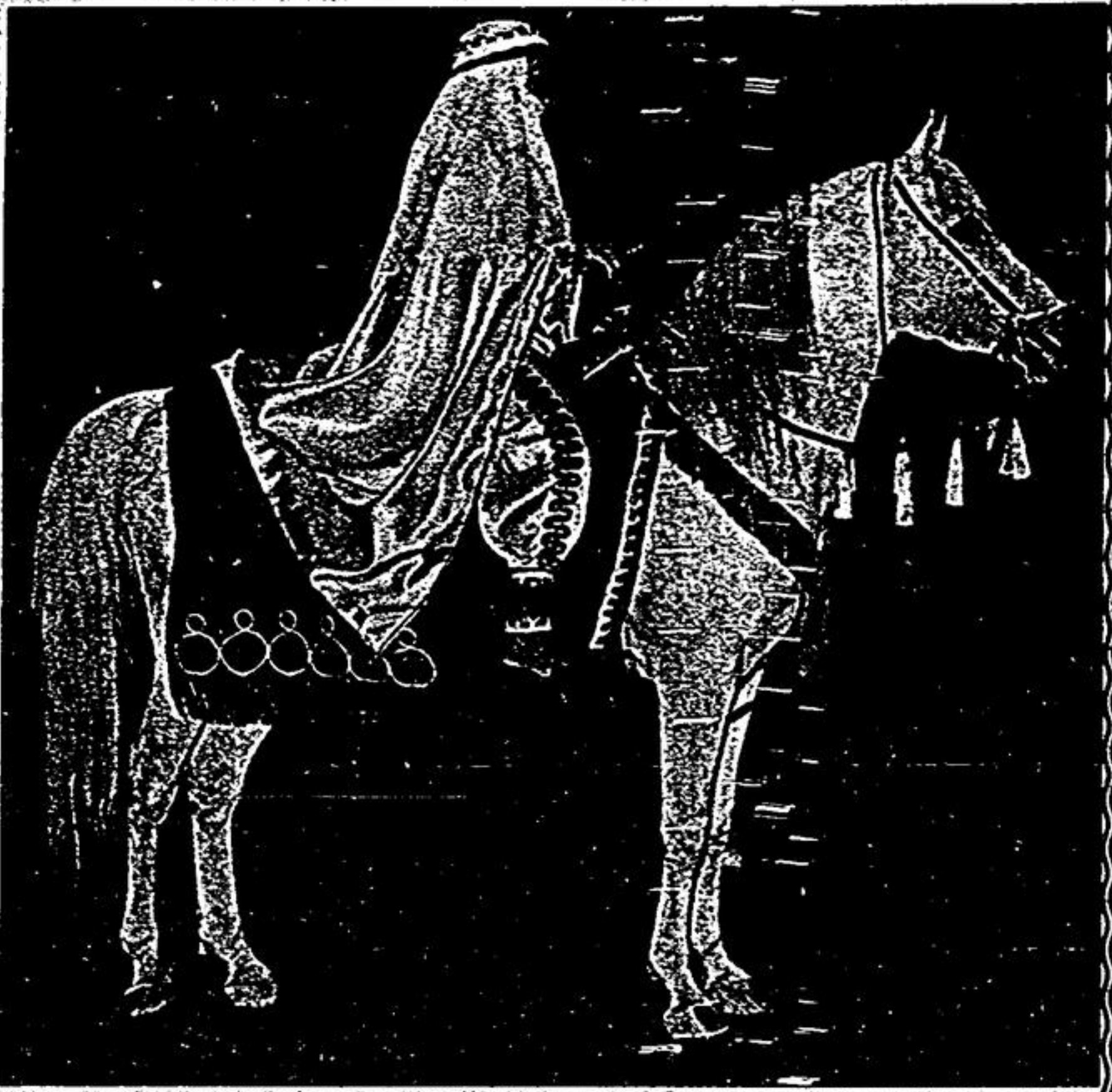

By-law to prohibit sale of soft drinks in bottles

PICKERING — Pickering Township Council resolved to direct the by-law committee to prepare a by-law prohibiting the sale of soft drink beverages contained in non-returnable glass containers.

"I think there'll be a bit of opposition to this," said Councillor Don Kitchen, "for the store doesn't have to concern itself with the problem of taking back empties now. And people buy their drinks outside and bring them in to the municipality, too."

Reeve John Williams said that this was on the agenda for the Mayors and Reeves Conference this year, and he didn't think this would have been necessary if there was power vested in a municipal council to prohibit the sale of a product.

"We can prohibit the sale of anything we consider dangerous to our ratepayers," said Councillor Arthur King. "We are fast becoming a township of broken glass."

Councillor John Kruger said that the sentiment expressed was valid, but "You cannot legislate against the carelessness of people."

"If there is a possibility that something can be done, let's take a look at it," said Councillor Victor Rudik. "The cans are a problem, too, but eventually rust and fall to pieces."
