## Request lights at level crossing

**GREEN RIVER** — The trustees of Pickering Township School Area 1 have indicated a concern for the safety of school children who twice daily, travel by bus over the C.P.R. level crossing on the Markham-Pickering townline, north of Green River.

In a recent letter to Pickering Council, the Area Administrator, Lloyd T. Johnston has, on request by the Board, recommended that automatic signal lights be installed at this location. Mr. Johnston informed council that the parents of children were also concerned over the existing hazard. He noted that in a recent accident at this site, two persons had been killed.

The Council has agreed to contact their engineer, Paul Paullion to learn which municipality, Pickering or Markham, is responsible.
