STOUFFVILLE — The Hi-C club of the Stouffville United Church has a 'foster child'. She's pretty 15 year old Maureen O'Connor of Prince Edward Island. This month, through the work of the Stouffville organization and the support of local merchants, Maureen will be our guest. The exact date of her arrival here will be announced next week.

For 8½ years, the Stouffville Hi-C has supported a 'foster child'. Originally, it was Yu Kin Man of Korea and last summer, the little lad was paid a personal visit by Ron Patrick, en route to a teaching mission with CUSO in Malasia.

Maureen's parents both work but additional financial assistance is required to provide the family with adequate food, clothing and education. Maureen is in grade 9.

Last May, 39 teenagers took part in a 15 mile



walkathon from Uxbridge to Stouffville and through funds, donated by town merchants, over \$400 was collected for this purpose. Now, the Hi-C members will meet Maureen in person and all Stouffville will be her host.
