First let us consider the photographer. He was covering an unfortunate accident — not because he likes to do this; he would much rather cover a happy event like a golden wedding or the like. However, accidents are news, and he is paid to cover all newsworthy events, good or bad.

While there he observed this scene, full of human emotion, and the axiom, "a picture is worth ten thousand words" still holds true. Since the photo-journalist is trained and paid to get such a scene on film, he did just that. True it is not the kind of picture you would hang in your living room, but to the photo-journalist it is a good picture.

An acquaintance said to me: "Why would they print it?" My retort was then and still is — "Why not?" Surely there is nothing to hide! When I first saw the picture I was

deeply moved. Here was a person I know, with a justifiable expression of anguish — perhaps even terror — beside the still form of her mother. I did not feel I was gaping, or seeing something I should not see. I felt only sympathy for her and the rest of the Cowie family. Surely many more felt this and I dare say many whispered a prayer.

Oh yes! It is true a tragedy had taken place, and I along with many others, probably including the photographer would like to have changed this. But God in His infinite wisdom has not granted us this power.

As well as sympathy, I felt a good feeling. Yes, even from this picture — because there was some-

one there, obviously trying to comfort Mrs. Herbert. Though that neighbour probably felt quite helpless at the particular moment, she was there doing her best. This made me feel good — down deep inside.

There is another aspect which I hesitate to mention, but feel must be said. From this picture I could see the anguish and pain that can result from a small error in judgment or whatever. Yes, what if it happened to me? What if I had been the driver of the truck? Oh yes, many things came to my mind; and I for one will use a bit more caution because of that picture. True, the lesson may not last long in many minds, including my own. But if that picture saves even one life through its message, it will be well worth the uproar

it obviously caused. As for your critics, I feel sorry for them. They only saw the picture — the

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DOES IT PAY TO RECONDITION USED CARS?

Well, you might say, it's a matter of opinion. Opinion among car dealers varies with their long term objectives.

If the dealer's objective is a fast turnover that will brighten his profit picture now, then the lower selling price of a car on which he has spent no money is most desirable.

If his long-term reputation with his customers is uppermost, then the costs of reconditioning for the sake of customer satisfaction will be money well spent, even though the immediate result may be a higher priced used car.

There are two kinds of used cars, however, that most dealers will agree on as not requiring any expense to ready them for resale. One is a car in such exceptionally good shape that its next owner is assured of reasonably trouble-free service; the other is a car that is too far gone in either age or condition to make the reconditioning expense economically wise.

In that event, the dealer will need as low a selling price as possible if he is to retail the unit. Most quality dealers favor reconditioning their used cars that justify the expense and wholesaling the problem cars that wouldn't ultimately return the money spent on them.

There is a two-fold advantage in this: Reliable used cars earn a dealer customer recommendations through word-of-mouth approval; they are also much more likely to find a ready market in the distrust-ridden used car market.
