

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150 attend Brownsberger reunion

VICTORIA SQUARE — On Saturday, August 17, at Victoria Square Community Centre, almost one hundred and fifty members of the Brownsberger family met in their first reunion.

Most of these people were descendants of George Brownsberger and his wife Elizabeth Lehman who emigrated from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania and settled with their six children just north of Ringwood in 1826. Two of these children died in 1828. Those surviving were Nancy (Mrs. Chris Musselman),

Veronica (Mrs. Samuel Reesor), Benjamin, who married Mary Davis; and Samuel who married Fanny Burkholder.

Just recently contact has been made with a Brownsberger family in Pennsylvania and eleven members of this family also joined in the reunion. As yet a family connection has not been established but there is no doubt some relationship. These visitors spent the weekend with Mr. and Mrs. Carl Reesor, Unionville R.R. Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Brownsberger of Ringwood and Mrs. Annie Dike of Markham R.R. 2. Mr. J. a. c. o. b. Brownsberger spoke briefly to the children of Ringwood Sunday School where he and his wife and uncle, John Brownsberger attended services. Mr. and Mrs. Erhard Haller attended Almira church with Mr. and Mrs. Reesor.

Mr. Carl Reesor acted as master of ceremonies, recounting memories of his grandfather, Samuel Brownsberger, and details pertaining to their early life in Canada.

On display was the original announcement of the sale of George Brownsberger's farm in Rapho Twp., Lancaster County, Penna., dated November 24, 1825. Possession was to be given the following April, at which time the family left for Canada.

Also of interest was a

show-towel embroidered by Elizabeth Lehman before her marriage to George Brownsberger. This has been handed down from mother to daughter in the family of Mrs. Veronica Reesor and is now the prized possession of Mrs. Luella Reesor.

An ancient family Bible printed in German and an account book, listing in German the blacksmith business details back to 1816 of George Brownsberger, are also in the family.

Oldest member of the family present was eighty-eight year old Mrs. May Crooks of Port Perry, and the youngest present was Paul Scott Chappell, of Toronto, just eight days old.

Communications have been received from scattered Brownsbergers in California, Idaho and Western Canada, as well as distant parts of Ontario who were unable to attend the reunion.

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
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
