New stamp schedule

A re-scheduling of release dates for Canada Post Office stamps was announced recently by Postmaster General Eric Klerans.

In order to provide an increased period for public awareness of the 50th Anniversary of the 1918 Armistice, a stamp on this theme will be advanced from the 6th November to 15th October, 1968. The international significance of the cessation of hostilities will also be recognized by production of the Armistice stamp in the 15c denomination suitable for overseas air transmission,

accompanying the decision to produce this issue in the 15c value will be a significant reduction in the printing order which is normally about 24 million.

A further re-scheduling also moves the stamp honouring Lieut. Col. John McCrae, the writer of "In Flanders Fields", from the 6th November to the 15th October.

Christmas stamps, originally scheduled for release on the 9th October, 1968, will not be placed on sale until the 1st November, 1968.
