The Claremont club will now concentrate on trying to bring the Community League trophy back to town.

At press time, Sunderland leads the series 2 games to 1. Although not definite, coach Roger Todd hopes to schedule a contest here Sunday at 2 p.m.

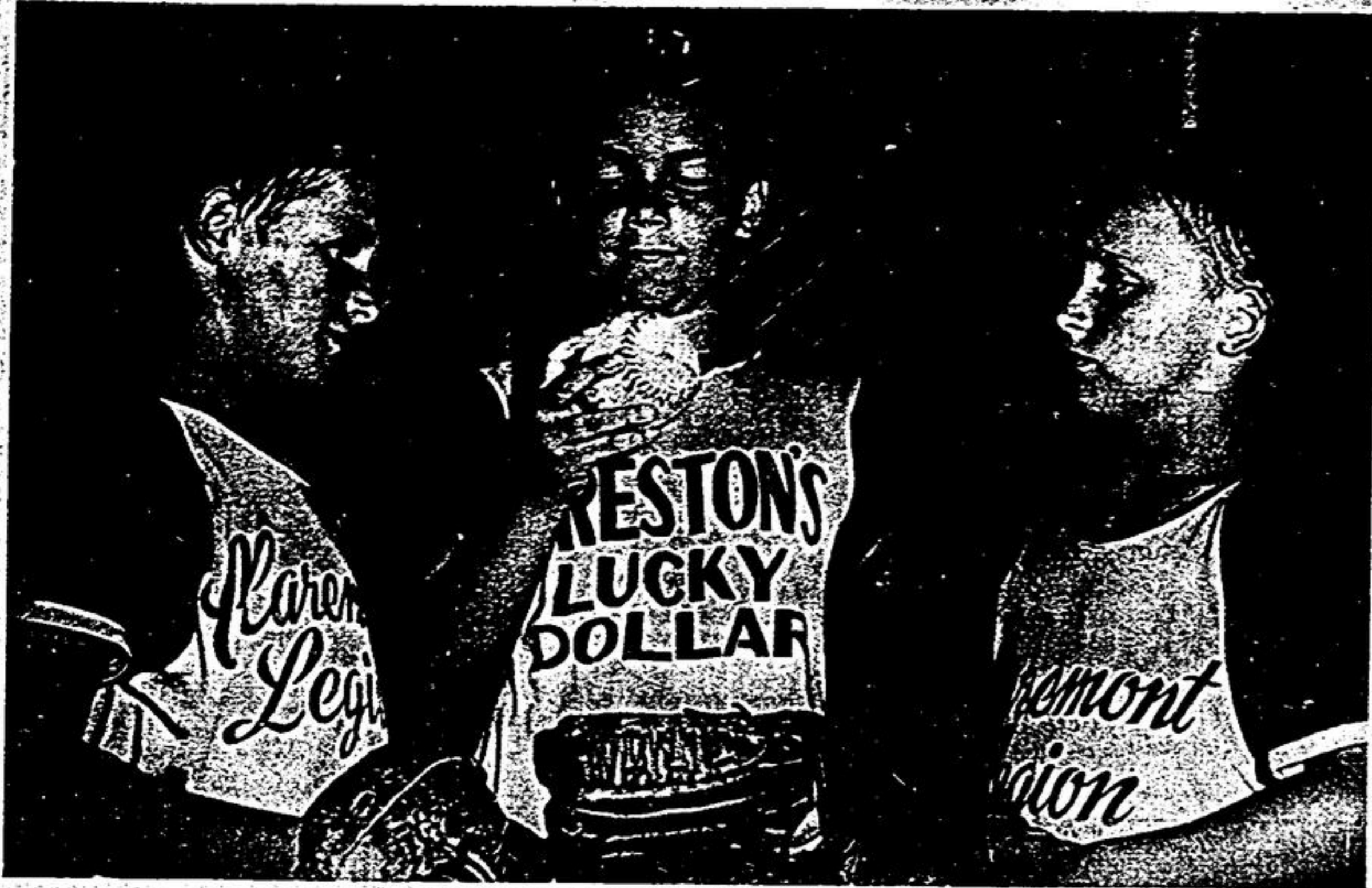
Stouffville blanked Cambridge 2-0 Saturday, to take the round 3 games to 1.
