## Tribune publisher writes from Holland

Amsterdam, Holland, Sat., Aug. 24, 1968

The Tribune: Amsterdam. Holland may be 3800 miles from the Stouffville area, but some of the problems are the same — one of most pressing, a shortage in the land here age of housing. Big ex is the cost of preparation. Soil is so soft that a n d fill m u s t be brought in great quantity to make building possible.

I visited a great new apartment development, all on reclaimed land. Fields dotted with Holstein cattle look very familiar. During the summer all the milking is done right in the fields.

The Zueiderzee, no longer known by this name, is an interesting spot. Contrary to popular belief, the great lake is fresh water, all the salt water having been pumped out over a period of a couple of years. Inland rivers now provide the water, and the sea is kept out by miles of dykes. Great areas of land, actually below the level of the sea, are being reclaimed. Marken and Volendam are two of the picturesque Dutch villages by the sea. Native costumes, including wooden shoes are common sights.

Amsterdam is buzzing with end of the season tourists as well as conversation on the Russian invasion. The beautiful war memorial in the city square by the Royal palace has been pretty well taken over by hippies in the daytime. Most of them are nomads from other countries.

Travel costs are quite reasonable but like most places food costs are up. Called by some,

the Venice of the North, Amsterdam presents a most pleasing picture and world atmosphere with its miles of canals running throughout the city.

The million people who live here are some of the friendliest and very forthright in their opinions. They are great flower lovers and home gardens are a must.

Pride and joy is the cleanliness of the windows and there was scarcely a residential street where some housewife wasn't shining — soap and water does it.

Toronto Airport is modern and is going to be enlarged but the Amsterdam Airport has many modern facilities which we don't see at home.

Along with the housing problem, common the world over, traffic problem too is terrific. Streets are very narrow, and every possible corner is crammed with parked cars. Added to these are the thousands of bicycles and motor bikes which jam every city roadway.

Commerce is brisk, people are well dressed and in the harbour, dry docks are jammed with ship repair work, just one of the important industries.

Streets are crowded in the evening with late evening diners and entertainment seekers. There are a host of wonderful eating places — night clubs are plentiful and one French journalist has written that the 'Red light district in Amsterdam is the most picturesque in the world!
