### New pastor at Second Markham baptist church

STOUFFVILLE — On Sunday, Sept. 1, the congregation of Second Markham Baptist Church welcomed their new pastor, Rev. Denis Gibson. Rev. and Mrs. Gibson have taken up residence in the parsonage with their four children, Denise, 13, Michael, 10, Shaun, 7 and Patricia, 3.

Born in Northern Ireland, Rev. Gibson received his public and secondary school education there, later graduating from Trinity College in 1952. After coming to Canada, he served on a summer mission field for the Presbyterian Church while attending the University of Saskatchewan. He received his B.A. degree in 1955. In 1954, Rev. Gibson married his Irish sweetheart, Iris McCombe. He

and his new bride returned to his native homeland, where he enrolled in Theology in the Presbyterian College, Belfast and the

Faculty of Divinity, Queen's University. During this time, he served as assistant minister in large city churches in Belfast. On completion of the diploma course, he was licensed to preach by the Belfast Presbytery, May 1958. He attained his Bachelor of Divinity degree at Queen's University, July 1958.

Application was made for service in Canada with the Commonwealth Mission Board of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Mr. Gibson was ordained November, 1958, by the Belfast Presbytery in the church where he attended as a boy. He was then appointed by the Presbyterian Church in Canada to Mission Service in St. Stephen, New Brunswick. A call to Amherstburg fol-

lowed in 1961 and then to Orangeville in 1964. Rev. Gibson served as the convener of the Committee of Evangelism and Social Action in the Chatham and Brampton Presbyteries.

The Second Markham Baptist congregation welcome Rev. and Mrs. Gibson to the community, and hope their stay will prove a pleasant experience.
