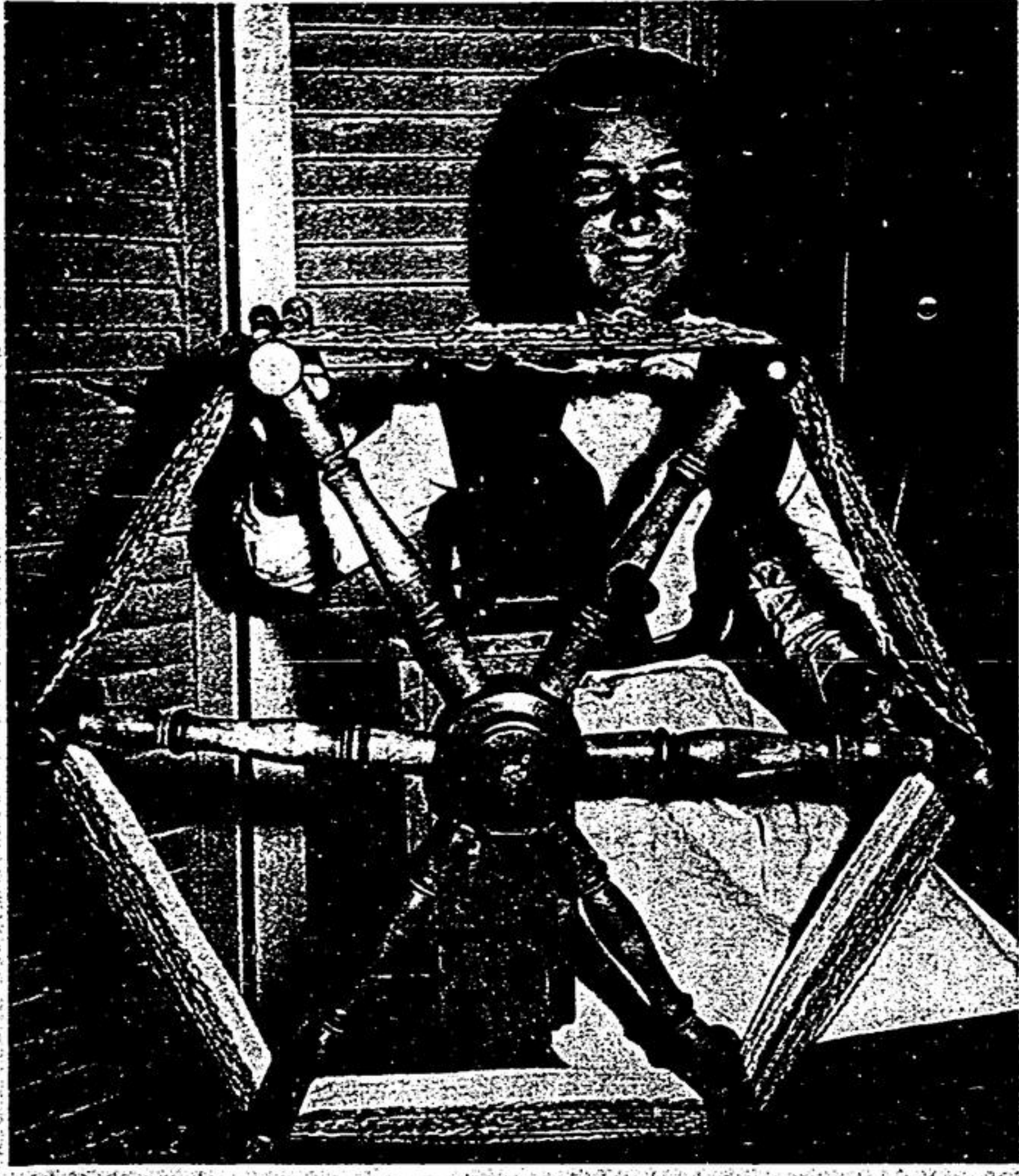


Over 4,000 visit Markham antique show and exhibition

Wages private war with Pickering reeve

PICKERING TWP. — What, on the surface, appears to be a private feud between the publisher of the Ajax News-Advertiser and the reeve of Pickering Township, John Williams, has created concern among some members of council.

In a recent editorial, publisher Ronald Lawrence issued a challenge to reeve Williams to outline his accomplishments since taking office Jan. 1.

At a meeting Sept. 3, councillor Arthur King charged that the editorial, addressed to Mr. Williams had cast doubt on the efficiency of the council as a whole and perhaps even the entire township. He said that members had a right to know the contents of the reeve's reply.

Reeve Williams said that the editorial offered a challenge to him, and assured council that he had accepted the challenge, and replied. The opinions in the reply, he said, were his own — not on any information, but statements of fact.

Mr. Williams said that he and Mr. Lawrence were going to have a sit-down session, and the publisher had agreed to take a look into Pickering Township and see what he feels is right or wrong.

Mr. Lawrence has many things to take into consideration before he starts lambasting Pickering Township and any of the members of council, said the reeve. "We have a council here who are working together in a joint effort like no council has ever worked before, for eight months. The problems have been in existence for many years. As far as I am concerned, we are doing well."

Councillor Vic Rudik questioned whether any accuracy went into an article about "Metro Muscine In", while Reeve Williams spoke about another article, under a heading, "Brock Road."

"To some people this would seem rather dramatic," he said, "for it indicated the township was up for auction."
