## Night flight to Zurich

A night flight to Zurich can be a real adventure. Fog closed in as our Swissair, Caravelle, jet moved over the continent. We left Gatewick, London, about 3 a.m. and came down at Basel at the corner where Swiss, German and French borders join. We had to proceed by bus the rest of the trip.

From Zurich into Austria is a beautiful drive by car. We passed through the principality of Lichtenstein, a little country once under Austria, once independent, now with Swiss administration.

Suchrums, Vandans, are picturesque Austrian villages nestled in the Alps, the Montafon Valley.

Looking out the balcony window of the hotel, the green heights stretch up and up, dotted with picturesque Austrian homes. The mountain cattle, much like our Jerseys, ranged even at the 7,000 foot level.

There's power in these mighty peaks, some with snow year round — the power is electrical. One of Austria's main exports is hydro power developed from mountain streams which are harnessed in

great pipe lines and reservoirs. The villages in this valley are prime winter tourist resorts, filled with attractive little hotels, with their Swiss-style roofs and flower-boxed balconies.

The commercial areas are spotless with flowers everywhere. Nearby, the season's third crop of hay is being cut and raked for drying. The whole family works in the field.

Job incomes I'm told would run from \$40 a week considered good and \$50 extra good. The Austrian franc runs 25 to the dollar.

A great many of the tourists here are German. The French, though nearby, are not so prone to travel. Hundreds of hikers young and old, are a regular sight along the mountain roads. This is a land of walkers.

Today we climbed to a mountain church. The pews are Puritan style, the ceiling high and vaulted with massive gold carvings. In the little church yard outside many of the grave-stones display pictures of the deceased.

Stores are well stocked and prices reasonable. Hotels and meals particularly are lower than home. Real estate prices are much higher if one can believe it.

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
