Urban-rural trustees for Pickering Twp.

PICKERING TWP. — A two-wad system, with one representative from School Area 1 and two representatives from School Area 2, has been established for the county school board election by Pickering Township council.

Two members were opposed, councillor John Kruger and deputy-reeve Ron Chatten. Councillor Arthur King was absent.

School Area 2 Board members hoped that some of the councillors would change their minds from the decision made at the committee meeting. Donald Quick presented a brief, urging council to reconsider, expressing the advantages of members elected at large in the whole Township.

"We are talking about wards and rural and urban when we should be talking about Pickering," he said, "the question is to consider problems on a county basis. The electors are not concerned with where the candidates live but what they can do."

School Area 1 chairman Mrs. Eleanor McKean said that the government saw fit to make two areas in Pickering Township, and perhaps its wisdom shouldn't be questioned.

"I am not looking for someone to represent the rural area of Pickering Township," she said, "I am looking for the possibility of someone in Pickering Township willing to assess all the problems."

Reeve John Williams reiterated his argument presented at the committee meeting supporting the ward system. He never had been in favor of two school boards in the township when other municipalities had one, he said, but he never wished that there would be no representative from the northern area of the township.

Councillor John Kruger said he would like to "de-spook" the idea of rural representation.

"There is no difference between urban and rural," he said, "and for that very reason we have here a situation where we should be one township."

Councillor Don Beer said that the danger in having some one elected over the whole township is that the area is so large that the people in the north would not know people who were running in the south, whereas in their midst they are known all over the township.

He maintained that it would be more costly for representatives to do their electioneering in a large area — there would be a lot of doors to knock.
