

Raceway

The \$1 million plan to create a world-class motor car raceway in southern Ontario is moving toward its hoped-for stamp of appreval from Metro Toronto council.

And if Metro authorities give their go-ahead - the decision is expected in the next couple of weeks - this region will be well on its way to overcoming the setback of having lost its bid for the 1976 Olympics.

In many respects, the proposed Lakeshore Raceway at the Canadian National Exhibition grounds will bring Ontario more world sports prominence than would the Olympics.

For instead of a oneshot affair, the Raceway will annually host two major international races. By running them over a road course at the CNE waterfront, the excitement and glamor of Grand Prix racing will be within reach of the average citizen.

Plans call for The Telegram Trophy Race to be run over the 2.3 mile course next June 15, and the Grand Prix of Canada on Sept. 21, 1969.
