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As I See It

Since Markham Village (it isn't a town yet) submitted its brief on rail commuter service very little has been heard in the way of promotion of that service in this area. Initially there was support from all the municipalities affected but since then it doesn't seem that much has been done.

There has, however, been considerable lobbying and promotion toward extending the service to the north. Vaughan Twp. has been most active in the "Go North" promotion and is receiving a lot of support from area municipalities and from the member of the Legislature for this riding.

With the amount of growth taking place in Markham Twp., Markham Village and Stouffville, there is an increasing need for good rail service. There should be a combined effort by Whitchurch, Uxbridge and Markham Twp. and the Villages of Stouffville and Markham toward active and persistent promotion of "GO" rail service for these areas.

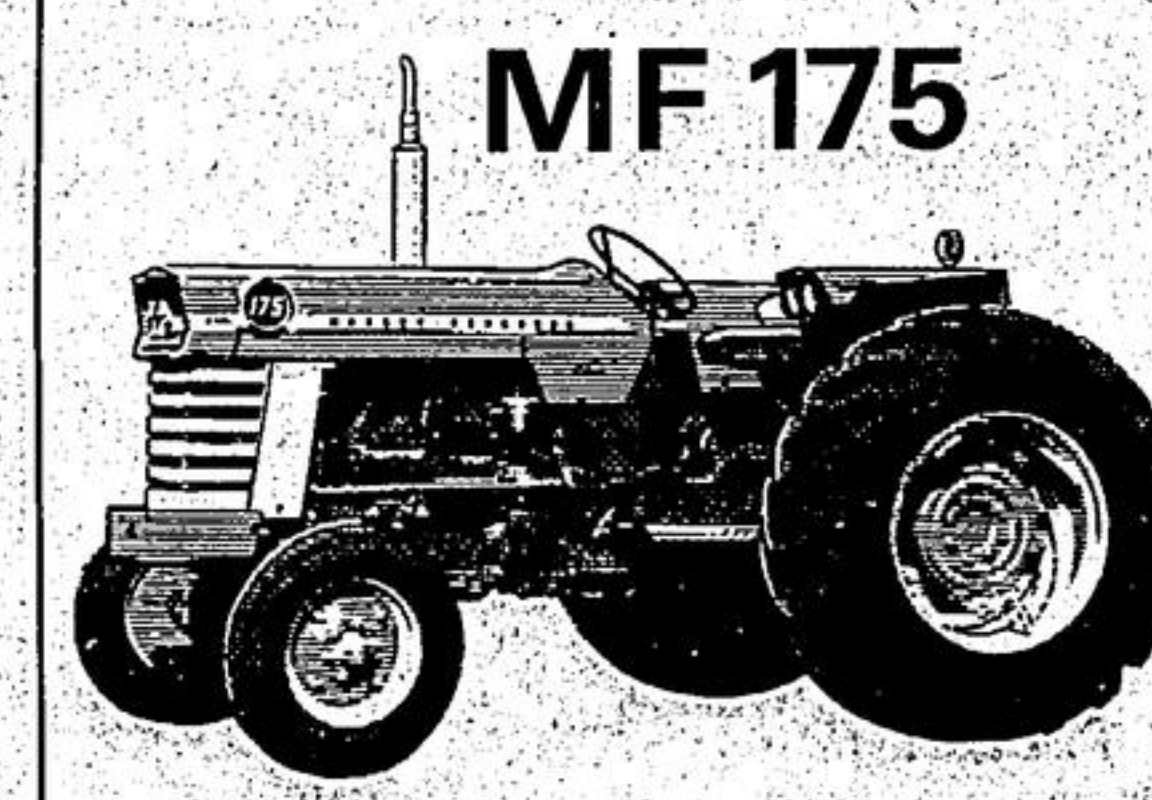
There is at present half a service going half way and before some new area is accommodated this service should be improved so as to be a useful asset instead of a liability. The rail line is in good repair and it can and should be used to the best advantage. With the recent indications of cut-backs in highway construction there is a good possibility more emphasis will be placed on the expansion of the rail commuter service.

We should now let the Provincial Government know we exist and just how big we are and that we intend to have the rail service brought into our area. It might not hurt to remind our respective members of the Legislature of this fact since they seem to give the impression, at least in this regard, that they don't even know us.

New visiting hours
