Council replies

Dear Sir: -

The editorial "The Secret Storm" date lined Sept. 26, 1968, suggests that a statement be made on behalf of the Council of the Twp. of Whitchurch with respect to a change made in the chairmanship of its Industrial-Commercial Commission.

To set the record straight, there is no secret storm other than a myth that you the Press, are now seeking to create. There has been no secret, closed door meeting of Council on this or any other subject and to imply such is false. Discussions have taken place in open sessions of Council and at its Industrial - Commercial Commission meetings. Council's action was protective toward the Deputy-Reeve in that it sought to relieve him of duties and responsibilities that have led to accusations of a conflict of interest.

Recognizing this, the Industrial - Commercial Commission sought to correct the situation by asking its chairman, the Deputy-Reeve, on two separate occasions, to resign. This resignation was never tendered as he failed to recognize the significance of his position in relation to both Council and his real estate business.

Council, faced with the intent of all members of its Commission resigning, had no choice but to make changes in its special and standing Commit-

TOWN 40,000 IN 30 YEARS

Submit four plans

STOUFFVILLE - Stouffville's present population is just over 4,000. By the year 2,000 it could increase to 40,000 or even higher. The growth estimate, almost too staggering to comprehend, was revealed at a meeting Oct. 1, arranged by representatives of the Central Ontario Regional Development Council. Members of Stouffville Council, planning board, public utilities commission and committee of adjustment. attended along with several interested ratepayers.

Four distinct plans were presented for consideration. Plans 1 and 2 deal with a concentrated buildup along the corridor between Bowmanville and Hamilton. Plan 3 is a concentration of subregional centres extending north-east to Port Perry and north-west to Streetsville, Milton and Kitchener. Plan 4 establishes a northern arc of satellite cities at Barrie, Alliston, Orangeville and Guelph, thus relieving the Toronto lakeshore area of growth pressures. The advantages and disadvantages of each of the proposals were outlined in the brief.

Meetings similar to the one held in Stouffville have been arranged for other centres bordering Metro, including the Counties of Halton, York, Peel and Ontario. Information will be compiled for presentation to the Provincial Government at Qucen's Park.

Stouffville's predicted growth factor within the next thirty years is based on the town's close proximity to Metro and its location near proposed highway arteries of 404 to the west and 407 to the south. Local dévelopment is expected to follow Highways 47 and 48.

Controlled growth

STOUFFVILLE -- By the year 2000, Stouffville's population could well reach 40,000 but for the present at least, residential build-up will be kept under tight control.

This was the response by Reeve Ken Laushway following a meeting Oct. 1 with the Central Ontario Regional Development Council.

While Reeve Laushway is the first to admit that his policy stand on this issue does not meet with the approval of all residents, he points to the financial position of the municipality and calls it 'excellent.' "This would not be the case if we had thrown the door open like Markham and Richmond Hill," he said.

Population figures established by the Metro Planning Dept. were estimated at 8,000 by 1980. The reeve said that Stouffville's growth has remained within these projected limits He stated that the town's present source of water supply would be sufficient to serve this number and the addition to the sewage plant would accommodate 9,000. "After that, a new type of system would be needed, perhaps a trunk main to Lake Ontario, a co-operative venture with many municipalities involved," he said.

On the subject of industry, he said he favored firms that would employ from 25 to 30 people rather than large factories employing 300. He said that under the government-sponsored Industrial Equalization Program, there had been more than 25 enquiries but none would pay the price of serviced land, quoted at \$15,000. per

Accomplished musician killed in tragic two-car crash

STOUFFVILLE - A 24 year old Stouffville man was killed. and his wife seriously injured in a tragic twocar accident, Saturday morning, on the Don Mills Road, north of Victoria Square.

Lloyd David Irwin. son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Irwin, Rupert Avenue, was a passenger in a northbound auto that crashed into the side of a southbound vehicle, driven by Ross McGill of Cooksville.

The cause of the collision is still under investigation but Markham Twp, police said that the McGill car, for reasons unknown, veered out of control and slid sideways into the (wrong traffic lane. Mrs. Irwin, although badly hurt, is recovering in York Central

Hospital, Richmond Hill. The couple were returning to Stouffville following a visit with friends in Toronto.

Investigating officers described the pavement surface as wet at
