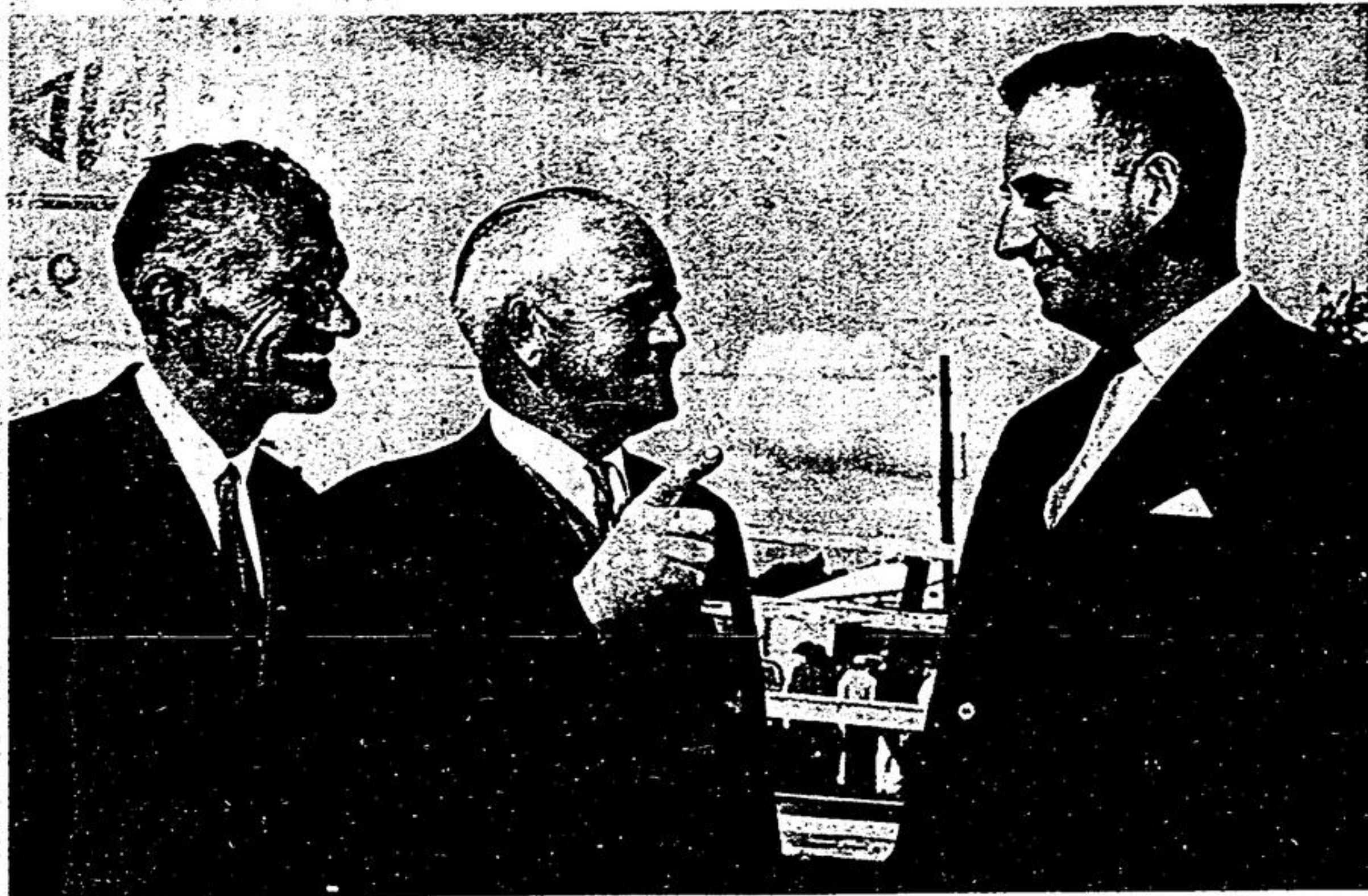


Camera catches sights and scenes from Markham Fair



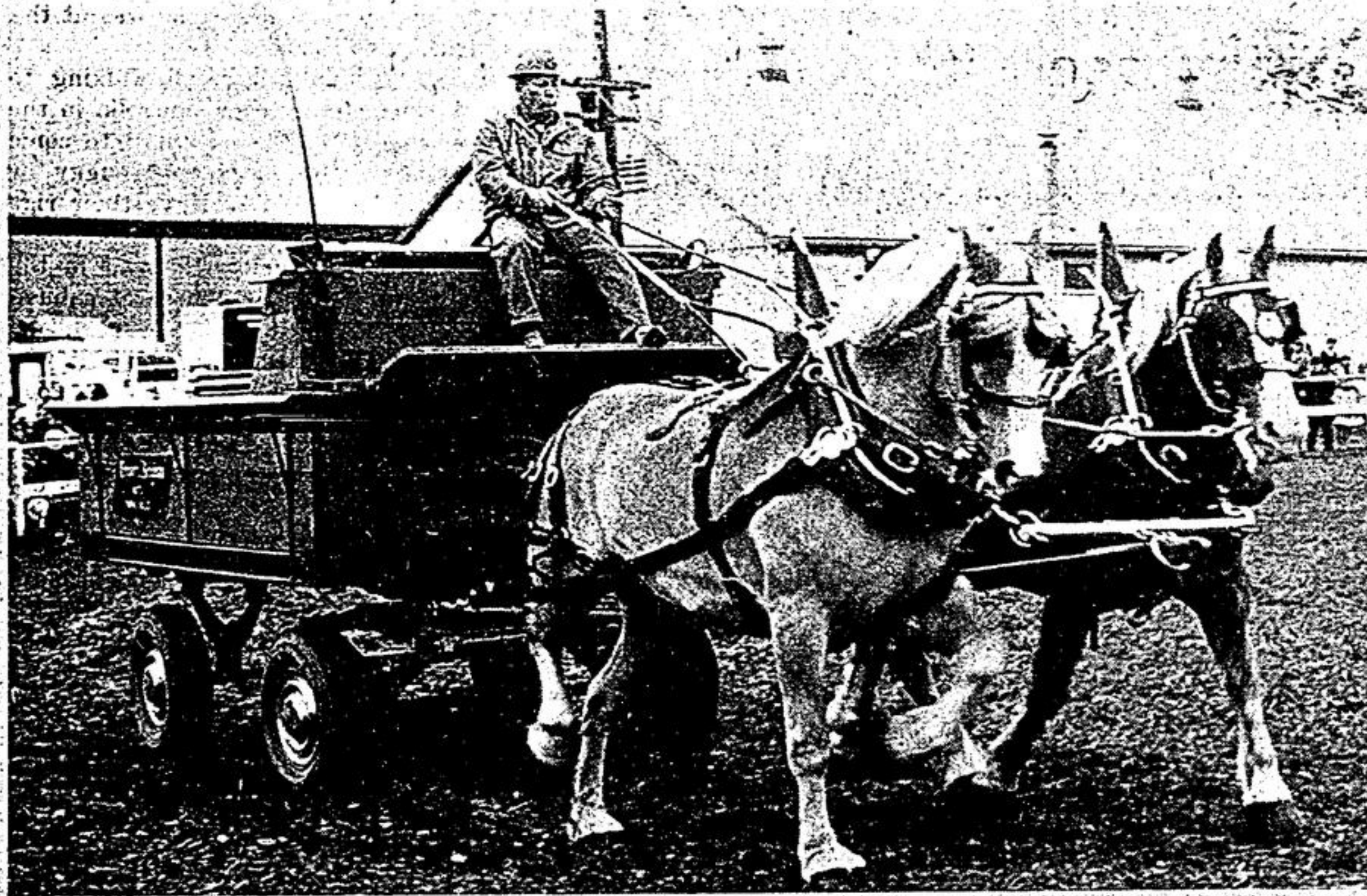

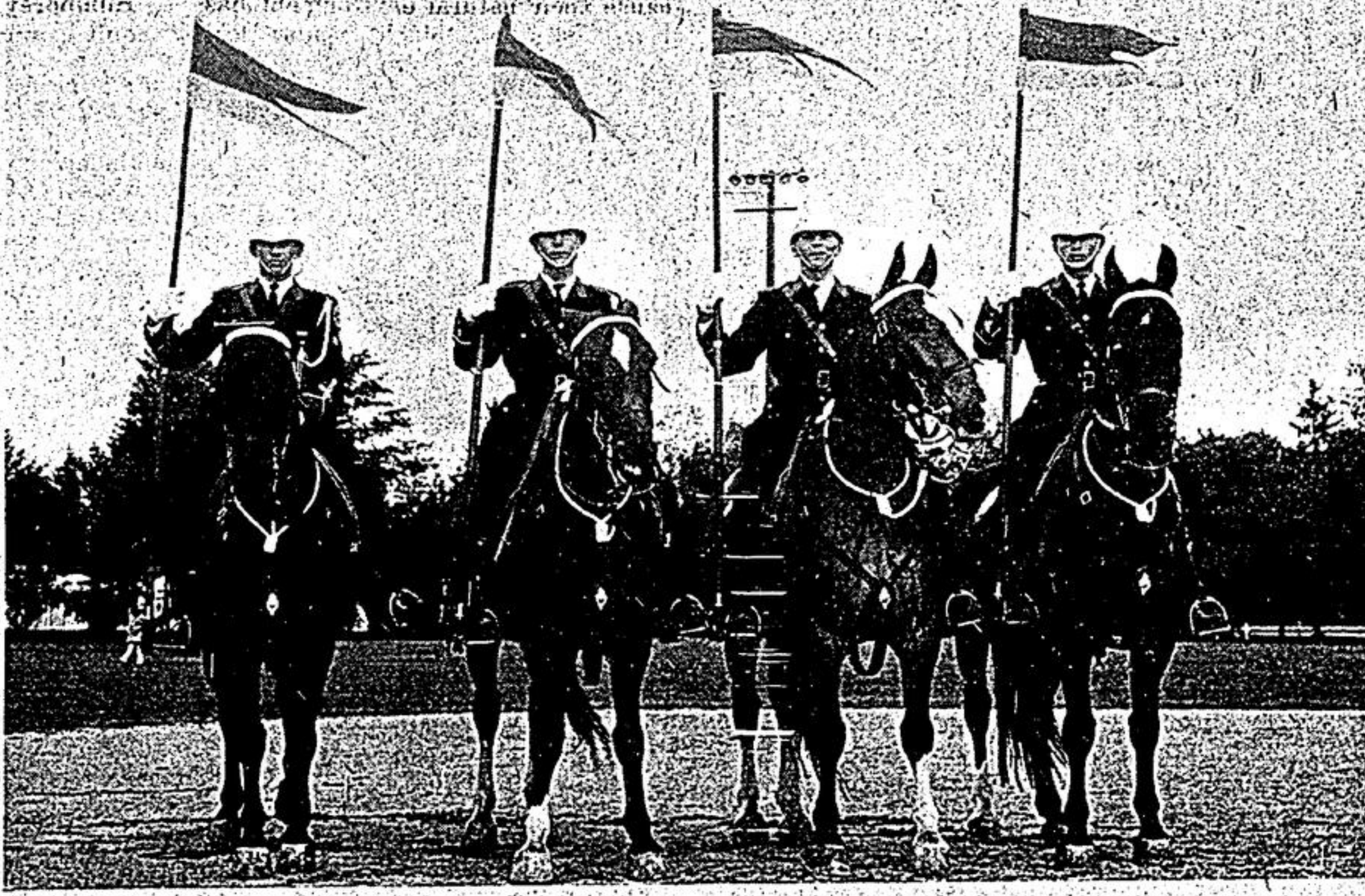

Military pageant

PIONEER VILLAGE — Toronto's Fort York and Metro Toronto's Black Creek Pioneer Village will carry out an exchange program on Sunday and Monday (Oct. 13-14) to provide a Thanksgiving flavor and colonial military pageantry to the Thanksgiving holiday weekend festivities.

On Sunday, commencing at 12:30 p.m., a 24-man guard from Fort York, wearing the uniforms of the British infantry or Royal artillery of 1812, and carrying flint-lock muskets with bayonets, will undertake field manoeuvres and drill at the Village. They will also fire two cannons.

The event will recreate a typical pre-Confederation routine whereby troops from Fort York marching to Lake Simcoe, would be given shelter for the night at a village along the route, and during the stop-over, they would carry out a drill.

On Monday, between noon and 5 p.m. the staff of Black Creek Pioneer Village will be on hand at Fort York to prepare a traditional Thanksgiving dinner circa 1812. The dinner will consist of roast duck with potato stuffing, candied cranberries, baked potatoes and squash, hot biscuits with churned butter, and pumpkin pie made on the spot from freshly-picked pumpkins.
