PICKERING TWP. — The discharge of firearms is prohibited in Pickering Township south of the Third Concession.

Council has passed the by-law so that hunters are aware of this restriction when they purchase their pheasant licences, now available in the clerk's office.

Pickering Twp. Clerk, Doug. Plitz anticipates objections, particularly those who like to hunt on their own properties, some of which are fairly well isolated.

Reeve John Williams said that council was responsible for the safety and well being of the residents, and it was difficult to define a line where people could be free to hunt.

The only disagreement among councillors was the amount of the maximum fine. Two amendments were made, one to increase the \$150 penalty recorded in this by-law to \$300; the other to \$250. Both were defeated.

Since council stated a penalty of \$300 for contravening the firecracker by-law, councillor John Kruger thought the same penalty should be exacted for firing bullets.

"Firecrackers are dealing with children who are care-free and it was to put some teeth into it," said councillor Arthur King, who admitted the pleasure he took from hunting. "I would like to believe that when dealing with mature, responsible people who are paying \$3.30 for a licence, we don't need to put that kind of teeth in it to control hunting."

"I think," retaliated the reeve, "that some of the people over 16 are far more care-free than those under 16."

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
