Riders receive awards

WHITCHURCH TWP. — If spectator interest is any indication, the Whitchurch Community Centre Equestrian Club's hunt and horse show was an unqualified success. About one hundred adults and children peered over and through the rails at the Vivian Thoroughbred Farm, Cherry Street, to watch the young competitors put their horses through their paces, Sunday.

The Hunter Class Cross-Country event with nine jumps and two slides was the highlight of the show. It drew thirteen entrants. The club's trophy for first place was awarded to Lynne Poole of King City who rode 'Tomahawk'. Steve Law captured the Hendricks Hardware trophy for his second-place finish and Carol England and Bill Parry won the third and fourth ribbons.

Maxine Andrews, a diminutive ten year old from Unionville, delighted the crowd and pleased the judge with her ride to earn the reserve standing.

The Junior Equitation, a test of poise and control, was open to riders under eighteen years of age. Fourteen contestants vied for the Houston Pharmacy cup.

Stouffville High's Sandy Allison aboard 'On My Way' won the judge's nod for first. Lynne Poole placed second and Gerry Parker third followed by Julie Rogers.

The Smith, Dorman and William award for the winner of the Senior Equitation was presented to

Helga Degen for her handling of a mount with the curious name 'Guess Who'. Bill Parry was the second place winner and Carol England was third. Shelagh Sommerville in the saddle of 'Mighty Mouse' rated fourth.

The Pleasure Horse part of the show saw Sandy Allison the recipient of the Norman Cox Real Estate trophy. Gerry Parker, a close second was followed by Maxine Andrews and Shelagh Sommerville.

Carol England, astride 'Beauty', took home the Mount Albert Creamery

award in the Hunter Hack division. Bill Parry's ribbon read "second" and petite Maxine Andrews earned another third just in front of fourth place Julie Rogers.

The Championship Trophy presented to the rider-horse combination with the highest total number of points was donated by Vern Davies of Cedar Beach. Sandy Allison became its proud possessor by virtue of first place standing in both the Junior Equitation and the Pleasure Horse trials.

The success of this Equestrian club's first horse and hunt show at Mrs. Eileen Spicer's thoroughbred farm was due in no small measure to the labors of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Parker and Mr. and Mrs. Karl Gloth, Steward Evan Hannis and announcer Keith Greenfield worked with judge, Mrs. Dianna Thompson to provide as one spectator so aptly described the show, "an excellent experience for the kids."

Steam train trip

STOUFFVILLE — The annual Fall Color Steam Excursion, sponsored by the Upper Canada Railway Society, will be held Sunday, Oct. 27.

Locomotive No. 6218 will leave the Union Station, Toronto and travel east to Belleville via Oshawa and Port Hope. It will return via the lower Kawartha Lakes through Campbellford, Peterboro, Lindsay, Uxbridge, Stouffville and Markham.

The departure time is 8:30 a.m. (E.S.T.) from Toronto with arrival back in the city by about 8 p.m. This would mean that it should come south through Stouffville at about 7 p.m. Space permitting, tickets can be purchased on the day of the trip. The cost is \$10.50 for adults; \$5.00 for children, 5 to 12 years and \$1.00 for infants under five.

Dickson's Hill road

Costliest driveway in Canada

MARKHAM TWP. — Unless Markham Township council agrees to assume a 66 foot road in a 5-lot Dickson's Hill Subdivision, the developer, B. N. Cooper, will be left with the most expensive driveway in Ontario.

Mr. Cooper appeared before council Oct. 15 to ask the members to reconsider an earlier decision. "Unless the township accepts the road, I will be ruined," he said. "I've put every cent I have into this effort."

Mr. Cooper said that he selected the six acre site at lot 31, conc. 8 because he wished to live in the country 'next to a church and nice people'. In an effort to pay for his own home, he decided to subdivide the remainder of his land and approval was received from the Committee of Adjustment. He admitted that he should have received approval from council but was given improper advice. "I'm down the garden path," he said. "I'll be wiped out unless the road is accepted. In Markham, there can be no division of lots on a private road allowance."

Mr. Cooper said that all five lots in the subdivision had been sold within a week, two for \$10,500 and three for \$10,000 each.

Councillor Alan Sumner said that in total, council could be dealing with a dozen lots. "We could find ourselves with a problem," agreed Reeve Stewart Rumble, "it's a poor place to put a road, it leads to nowhere."

Mr. Cooper appealed to the members to view the location. "If the road is not accepted, I'll wind up with the most expensive driveway in the whole of Ontario."
