Stouffville United Church has been granted permission by the municipal council to erect a new directional church sign on the south boulevard near the Church St. corner.

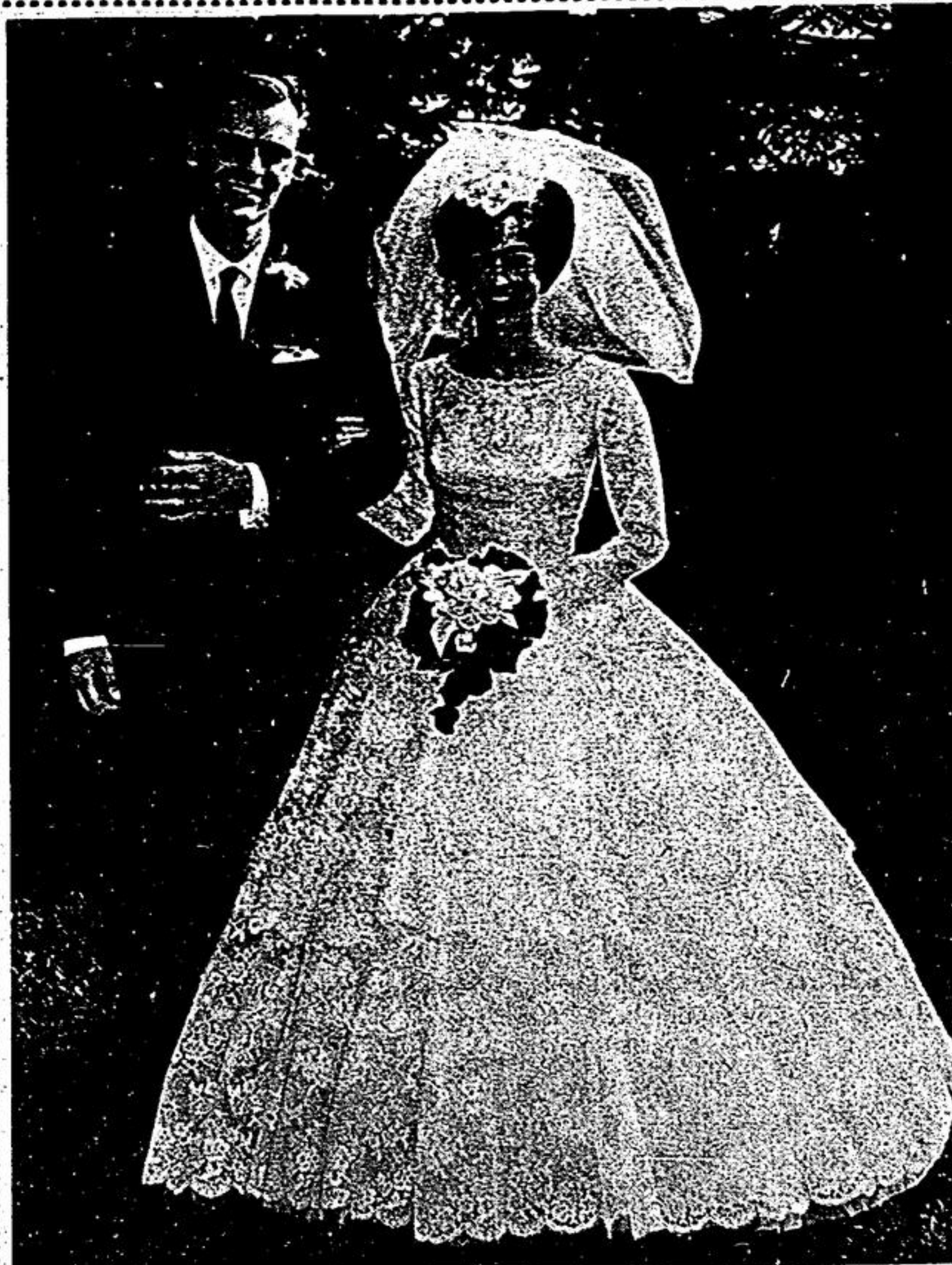
