MARKHAM TWP. — Robert James Sloan, 46, former councillor in Ward 1, has announced his candidacy for Reeve of Markham Twp.

Mr. Sloan, a 10 year resident of Markham, said he was taking this step because he was concerned about the future development of the township. "There appears to be a lack of direction from the top. Markham is on the threshold of a major residential-industrial boom, but those now directing our destinies seem to have no comprehension of what has to be done," Mr. Sloan

says. "There is no leadership, no concept of what the future really means. I believe I have a good, sound program to protect the character of the township, one that will provide a comprehensive approach

to our problems," Mr. Sloan continued. His major concern is to promote a proper industrial, commercial and residential mix that would benefit all residents of the township. "We must seek to build

a strong industrial base so that our residential taxes are kept to a minimum. "But we must ensure that is located so it won't damage existing residential areas. This means long-range planning and I in-

end to make sure there is a climate in Markham for proper planning," he says. Mr. Sloan served on Markham council in 1963-64. He is married and has one daughter.

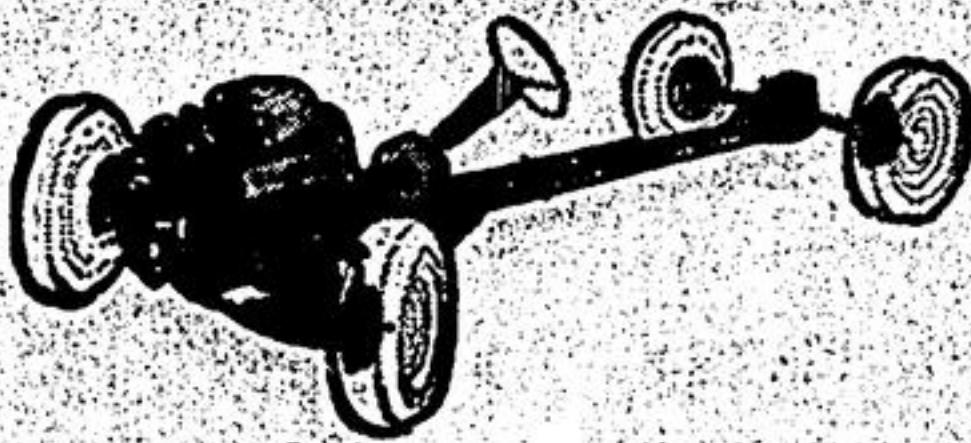

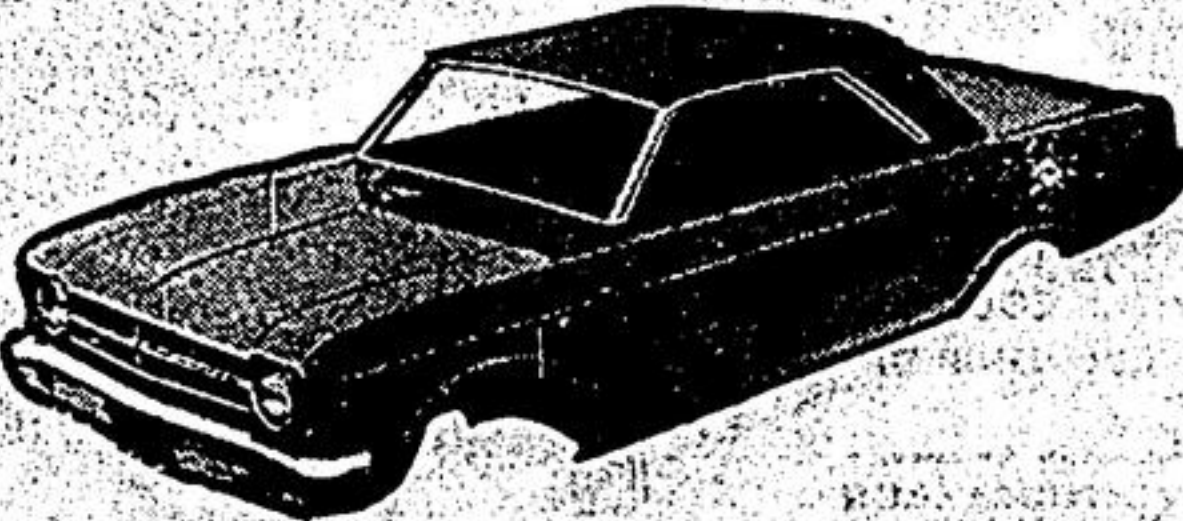
