

Markham students attain 12 year accident-free record

Receive safety award

MARKHAM — Six hundred students of Markham's James Robison Public School applauded the guest speakers as, one by one, they addressed their attentive young audience. But instead of applauding the visitors, they should have been applauding themselves. For mainly through their own efforts and those who had gone before, they had established a twelve-year period without a single accident — a provincial record. A trophy, to mark the occasion and made available through the Markham-Unionville Lions Club, was presented by Hon. Matthew B. Dymond, Minister of Health, to Mr. Lloyd Wideman, staff supervisor of the school safety patrol. It has 48 members.

Three patrol captains and six assistants including Randy Jeffers, Christine Knight, Rod Synce, Sheila Wilson, Dwight Ramsey, Helga Schmidt, Beth Patrick, Dianne Szepiala and Christine Miller formed an honor guard at the school entrance and escorted Dr. Dymond to the platform. Others present included Police Chief Fred White, Mrs. Merna Colbourne, chairman of the Board, Mr. Maynard Hallman, area superintendent, Mr. Lloyd Abernethy, supervising principal, Donald Hindson, President of the Markham-Unionville Lions Club and other representatives of village, and Ontario governments.

The principal of James Robison School is Mr. Douglas Ford.

In introducing Mr. Dymond to the children, Chief White recalled that it was nine years ago that Mr. Dymond, then Minister of Transport, had presented the pupils of 1960 with their safety shield. As a former school trustee, Mr. White said that the Minister filled a dual purpose — knowledge of school children, and concern for their health.

Dr. Dymond said that attaining such a record denoted close co-operation between the pupils, the police, the teachers and the parents. "You, the students, could not do it alone, neither could the program be a success without your interest," he said. Reminiscing somewhat, he noted that school conditions had changed drastically since he was a boy and in like manner, so had traffic. He stated that motor traffic accidents account for more ill health among young people than all infectious diseases put together.
