Master organ builder

MARKHAM — On Wednesday, October 23, Mr. Robert Franklyn (Frank) Vance, a well-known and highly respected resident of Markham Village, passed away in Scarborough General Hospital. He was 75.

Mr. Vance was best known for his knowledge of organs and could assemble the most intricate of parts with the greatest of precision. One such project was in St. John's Lutheran Church at Waterloo, a pipe organ costing \$45,000. He also installed an organ in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church at Markham where he was a member.

Mr. Vance was employed for a time with the Legge Organ Company and later with Eaton's. Before entering this profession, he operated a grocery store in Toronto.

Born in Guelph, the son of William Vance, he was married in 1924 to Isobel Kaufman who survives along with two sons, William and John; one brother, Wilfred and one sister, Mrs. Helen Laidlaw. Rev. D. R. McKillican conducted the service, Saturday from the Dixon Funeral Home, Markham with interment, Elmwood Cemetery.
