Reeve to officiate

STOUFFVILLE — O.H.A. Intermediate 'B' hockey returns to the Stouffville Arena Tuesday night and if the Clippers home-opener compares with the three pre-season exhibition encounters, then fans should be sitting on the edges of their seats.

Whitby are the visitors. Game time is 8:30 p.m. Stouffville reeve Ken Laushway will drop the first puck.

Although coach Don Haynes appears to have a fine array of both youth and experience available for Tuesday's debut, the exact lineup will not be revealed until game time. A first-string front line could include Bob Hassard, Wolfgang Schlombs and Bob McNeil. This trio was impressive in the team's 4-3 triumph over Cobourg, Sunday. In their home-and-home encounter with Whitby the Clippers lost 10-4 and won 8-6.

Either goaltenders Glenn Jackson or Dennis Forsyth could get the starting nod. Jackson was brilliant against Cobourg while Forsyth performed well against Whitby.

The majority of Stouffville players will not be new to local fans. They include Ronnie Jones, Ken Aida, Bud Lehman, Ray Pipher, Dan Pettit, Art Rennick, Geoff Gaston, Carl Keffer, Bob Hassard, Wolfgang Schlombs and of course, the playing coach himself, Don Haynes. A few new faces will also be around, including Al Patterson, Bob Smith and Bob McNeil. A good turnout of fans for Tuesday's fixture would give the club a big boost.

Stage Rally

In Tuesday night's exhibition encounter with Whitby, the goal judges were almost as busy as the players. The red light flashed on eight times for the Clippers and 6 for the visitors. During a 64 second interval in the second period, each team scored twice.

At the conclusion of the first period, Whitby led 1-0 and continued to lead 5-4 at the end of the second. Then the Clippers began to move and were rewarded with four counters to Whitby's two in the final frame.

Al Patterson fired what proved to be the winner while his team was short handed and then followed up with the insurance marker.

Lloyd Seymour pulled off a hat-trick and Bryan Fletcher had a good night for the losers with two goals and one assist. The victors' Geoff Gaston and Al Patterson scored two tallies.

After replacing Glenn Jackson at the midway mark of the second stanza, Dennis Forsyth put on a sparkling display to keep the Clipper ship afloat. He was aided by a stout defence which included Ken Aida and Bob Hassard who played in the absence of Don Haynes.

Stouffville collected five of the seven penalties, in a good, clean, but hard-checking game before an enthusiastic crowd of home town supporters.

Aurora spoils Markham debut

MARKHAM — It's great to win the first home game of the season but such was not the case for Markham's Junior "B" O.H.A. entry. The Seal-A-Wax Six tangled with the Aurora Tigers last Friday night for sixty minutes before leaving the ice with the scoreboard reflecting 3 for the visitors and 2 for the home team.

The official opening which preceded the contest included a welcome by Reeve Alma Walker to an estimated crowd of 750 settled in the comfortable seats recently purchased from the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto. Markham district's oldest hockey fan, Bob Walters, had the privilege of being escorted by two pretty members of the booster club to the centre ice and the honor of dropping the "first puck."

Aurora scored early in the first period when Bob Gaston took a pass from Dave Clancy and Ron Clarke and propelled the

puck past Rick Johnston in the Markham nets. The goal went unanswered as the local team played in shoddy fashion with erratic passing, weak back checking and occasional defense lapses. The Tigers' aggressive play earned them 3 of the 4 penalties during the first twenty minutes of play.

Aurora continued to out-muscle a n d out-hustle Markham in the first half of the second period and were rewarded with another tally. This time the Seal-A-Wax defense looked particularly inept as Bert Harvey scored on a pass from Gary Clarke. Then the Markham squad settled down and Graham Wise put them back in the game with assists from Steve Vickers and Vern Brown. Rick Johnston drew enthusiastic applause from the fans as he made at least three key saves during the period. As a result of a mild don-nvbrook the penalty total

of 6 was shared equally by each team.

In the final twenty minutes the Markham team came alive. The lines began to jell, the defence strengthened and the players showed a spirit not evident in the first two periods. It appeared that the Seal-A-Wax crew might salvage a tie after Jim Witherspoon and Gavin Kirk set up John Harris at six minutes and 36 seconds but 44 seconds later the Tigers lunged ahead on John Gafne's goal from Ron Clarke to lead 3-2. In the final minutes of play, Markham put considerable pressure upon the opposition and eventually pulled their goalie but one goal edge stood the test.

First star status would have to be given to Markham's net minder Rick Johnston who frustrated the Aurora attackers from all angles and distances throughout the game.
