The appointment of the Fire Chief for Markham Village should clear up any doubts in the minds of the people involved. Since the resignation of the former chief, controversy pro and con has gone on over the appointment of a replacement. The fire fighters were trying to protect certain interests and the Fire Committee and Council were trying to protect equally certain interests. In working toward this end many feathers were ruffled and possibly rightly so. This is, however, all water over the Milne Dam, and the appointment, for a couple of reasons, should set the whole matter straight.

Five applicants took the Fire Marshal's examination, four from the Village and the fifth from another brigade. The results show all five attained a passing grade. In view of this I should think it safe to assume the successful applicant received the highest result and the job. The results show there was merit in the Fire Committee requesting the examination to determine the qualifications of the applicants. They also point out the fire fighters were right in their insistence there were qualified men on the brigade without looking elsewhere and the appointment of one of their number bears this out.

Something else is brought out which is possibly of even more importance to the citizens of the Village. Critical as I am of the manner in which the problem was handled and of some of the statements about it all residents should now be aware of the fact that we have a qualified Fire Chief and right behind him a brigade with at least three more qualified members. This can only mean these men have been well taught and their lessons equally as well learned. It all adds up to make an efficient and capable fire brigade, properly prepared to protect this Village and its residents.

Congratulations go to Mr. Ted Gough on his appointment and to Markham Village Council for their wise choice.

## Trustees from three wards

**PICKERING TWP.**—For the purpose of electing members from Pickering Twp. to the new County Board of Education, the municipality will be divided into three separate wards.

The decision was reached after several meetings in which the issue was the subject of much debate. Approval of the ward system came on a 4-3 recorded vote. In favor were Reeve John Williams, councillors Donald Beer, Donald Kitchen and Victor Rudik. Opposed were deputy-reeve Ronald Chatten and councillors Arthur King and John Kruger. The latter three felt that the trustees should come from the township at large.

"As of the first of the year there will be no Areas within the township," said Reeve Williams, "the township is simply electing three representatives to the County Board on a ward basis."

The nomination meeting is Nov. 18. The election date is Dec. 2.

Ward 1 will include the northern part of Pickering Twp., south to Hwy. 401 and conc. 1, from Dixie Road west. The popula-

tion of this area is 10,051. Ward 2 will include the Pickering Beach area to Hwy. 401 except Ajax, and from the west boundary of Ajax to the centre of Frenchman's Bay. The population is 9,028.

Ward 3 includes the south-west corner of the township to the Pickering-Scarborough townline and north to conc. 1. The population is 10,718.

## Holsteins make record

**OAK RIDGES**—Two purebred Holstein cows in the herd of R. R. Dennis, Oak Ridges, have recently completed a fine record of performance production tests. As a 12 year old in 305 days on twice-a-day milking, Bridge Lea Reflection Idena produced 21,158 lbs. of milk containing 841 lbs. fat, average test 3.97 percent butterfat. This record has a Breed Class Average of 194 percent for milk and 210 percent for fat.

For this achievement, Idena was awarded a Superior production certificate by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada.

In nine lactations, Idena produced 185,931 lbs. of milk containing 7,360 lbs. of fat, average test 3.96 percent butterfat. For this she was awarded a Gold Seal production certificate by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada.

Idena is classified "Excellent" for body conformation.
