# Haynes stars in home opener

## Beat Whitby 6-4

STOUFFVILLE — In the opening game of the season, the Stouffville Clippers treated over 275 home-town fans to the taste of victory. The Whitby Intermediate B team put on spurts of power but were not consistent enough to overtake the Stouffville club and had to settle for the short end of a 6-4 score.

**Jolting Checks**  
Two early Clipper goals and a barrage of stiff checks in the first period appeared to take some of the drive out of the visiting players. Don Haynes, Clipper coach, was a standout for three periods of play but was particularly effective with his solid body-checking early in the game. Ron Jones, his defence mate also came up with a fine effort. Wolfgang Schlombes put Stouffville in front

and then an unassisted goal by Bob Tripp made it 2-0. Whitby rallied to narrow the lead as Pat Casey found the corner after picking up a loose puck in front of the Clipper cage.

**Looks Easy**  
The sole marker in the middle period was credited to Bob Hassard whose smooth, calculated play made it look so easy.

It was open season on goalies in the final frame and each guardian of the

net allowed three markers. The losers came within a goal of tying the game when the Stouffville rearwards dropped momentarily, giving Eric Christie the opportunity to score. Carl Keffler found the mark to redeem himself in part for five foolish penalties he picked up in the course of the evening. Then Pat Casey bounced back for Whitby to get his second tally and reduce the margin. The Clippers went to work and put the game in their pocket with two fast goals by Captain Ken Aida and Bob McNeil.

Elmer Tran, who was one of Whitby's best with a goal and three assists beat Glenn Jackson on a penalty shot with less than three minutes to play to end the scoring.

If Tuesday's game is a preview of what is to follow for the duration of the home schedule, the hockey enthusiasts will be well rewarded for their interest and support.

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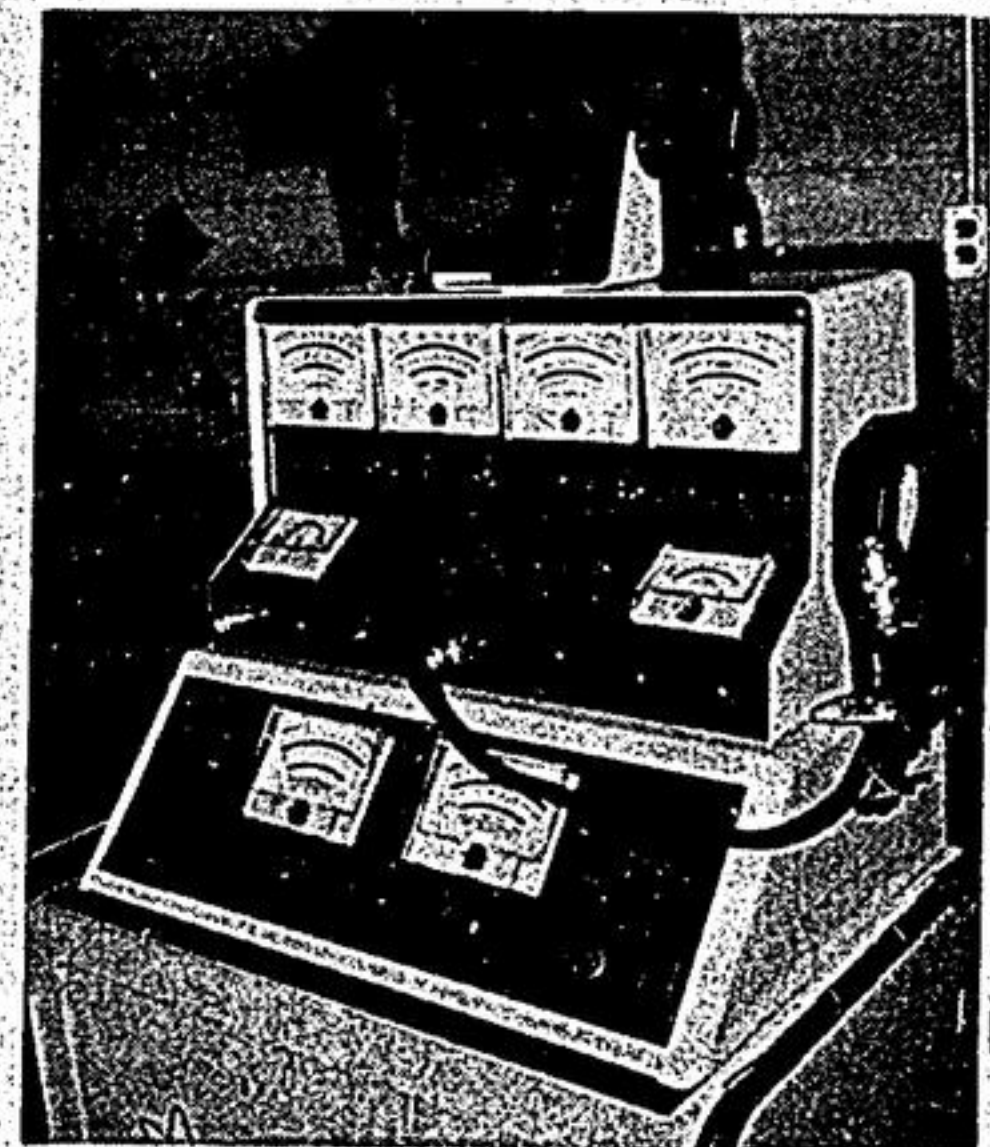
