New candidates enter election

MARKHAM TWP. — Although the nomination meeting isn't until Monday Nov. 18, elections in two Markham Twp. wards are already assured.

In Ward 2, a vacancy has occurred with the announcement by councillor Anthony Roman that he will contest the office of deputy-reeve against incumbent Sidney Gadsby. In the more rural Ward 3, two and possibly three candidates are in the running. The seat is currently held by councillor Charles Hoover. Eldred King, conc. 8 and Phil Mihorcan, conc. 7 will allow their names to stand. Nominations will be ac-

cepted from 7 to 8 p.m. at the Women's Institute Hall, Buttonville.

In Ward 1, Councillor Alan Sumner will seek reelection. Reeve Stewart Rumble will be opposed by ex-Ward 1 councillor, Robert Sloane.

Candidates to represent Markham Twp. on the new County Board of Education will be nominated at the same time. Five are presently in the running for three positions.

Farmers' union delayed

The final decision regarding unity with the Ontario Farmers' Union will be left to the general organization members of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, and may be known in one month's time. This was decided in the final day of the OFA's 32nd annual convention at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto.

Copies of the Resolution Committee report which was brought to the floor yesterday will be sent to all organizations for distribution to their mem-

bers. They will meet December 12 in Toronto for their monthly meeting. The topic will be decided at that time.

The Resolution Committee report combines the works of the special six-man committee on unity which was revealed Monday. In it there was a plan from both organizations.

The report will be made available to the OFU to be acted upon as they so desire. Their convention is in three weeks in Kingston.

Charles G. Munro, pres-

ident of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, welcomed the move by the delegates because "farm people in the country will be able to assess the proposal and direct their locals how to act."
