John Roberts, M.P., delivers maiden speech

YORK-SIMCOE — This past week the House of Commons has been engaged in the budget debate. This debate, while pegged on the budget, is of general nature—and members usually speak on whatever subject they desire.

On Friday, I used this opportunity to deliver my maiden speech in the House of Commons.

A maiden speech — the member's first speech — can be a frightening occasion. Some of the best known politicians have muffed it. Disraeli's first speech in the British House of Commons was howled down.

The main part of my speech dealt with two inter-related subjects. They may sound a little abstract but they are — I believe — going to be at the centre of our politics for the next 20 years.

The first of these problems is that of how to organize our regional development and economic planning administration in government.

The second is the necessity of reforming the budget — making procedures in Canadian government.

On the first point I said: "It has become almost trite to say that Canada is moving out of an era of welfare politics, and into a period in which a primary concern will be the programs and politics of economic development. Our past programs have often treated the symptoms rather than the disease of poverty. The key to combating the poverty problem is to channel more funds to realizing the untapped potential of under-developed regions of our country. Their function must be to provide—not a permanent crutch for lagging sectors—but temporary infusions of capital which will bring these regions to a level at which they too can contribute to our national prosperity."

Obviously our economic planning must involve close co-operation with the provincial, and municipal governments. But one danger of this co-operation may be to remove the planning process from the effective scrutiny of the political process. Planning agreements hammered out in consultation with the provinces would become rigid documents. The House of Commons on the one hand and the provincial legislatures on the other, will be told that nothing can be changed since changes would restart the whole process of consultation and negotiation.

"In other words there is a real danger that the planning for regional development will become—in an exact literal sense—an irresponsible process. Positions will be taken with the provinces by planners and technocrats. For parliaments and legislatures to bring effective scrutiny and control to such a process will be extremely difficult."

"I then went on to describe some ways these dangers might be avoided through the effective use of parliamentary committees and citizen participation. My second argument concerned budgetary policy. "In most countries the government departments responsible for economic development sooner or later run headlong into the policies of ministries of finance. The concern of minister's of finance is after all the short term view of the next 12 months. The view of economic planners is the 5, 10 or even 20 year scale. In government the urgent often takes precedence over the important. The problem is how to ensure that the planning voice is heard strongly in government councils which are markedly oriented to immediate budgetary and fiscal concerns."

"Obviously some economic decisions being considered by a government cannot be discussed publicly. "But I believe it would be useful to have more information than we now receive—in a general way—on the various economic measures the government is considering. "Advice which is too narrowly channelled through one small group of people—and this is what happens at the present time—no matter how able

those people are—is likely to prove, eventually inadequate. This is one reason I welcome the announcement of the recent appointment of an economic advisor to the Prime Minister. I hope that one of his jobs will be to provide an assessment, independent of the finance departmental view, of proposed economic policies. It would also be helpful if the forecasting services

of the Department of Finance were improved and eventually—what the government reveal the long term forecasts on which it is working. "These forecasts should be treated not as fixed goals which it is the determination of a government to achieve. They should be looked at as "best estimates" and it should be recognized that policies will change as circumstances

change. "But such forecasts, and policies tentatively framed in relation to them, will give us a much better assessment of a government's economic performance. At the moment it is too easy to justify economic success and failure as a result of these imponderable factors in unrealized forecasts. "Regardless of the difficulties of the forecasting process government obviously must come to some view of what the performance of the economy is likely to be over a five year period as a context for the yearly budgetary program. Indeed, in terms of the allocation of governmental program priorities, the government must look at the life of a parliament as a planning period. Government program priorities are linked to budgetary allocation. "A budget can only properly be assessed when viewed in the context of the longer period of government legislation and spending plans."

My closing words were spoken in French. Here is a rough translation of them.

"Since this is the first time I speak in the House of Commons I would like to say a few words to my French-Canadian colleagues. Mr. Speaker, I have an idea of Canada—the idea of a country based on North American egalitarian principles, a country of two languages and several cultures, rich from a material point of view—even richer from the point of view of the human spirit. I am convinced that the full participation of French Canada is required by such an image of our country. I want for French Canadians an equal role in the direction of this country—so that they have a real, not symbolic power in our governmental administrative and economic life. To all members, Mr. Speaker, on both sides of the House, I wish to say that I am extremely proud to be their colleague, to be among them, and to have the honour of participating, even in a minor role in the government of our country."

Town awarded medal

For the first time in Canada, a Boy Scout Award of the Medal of Merit has been made to a town. This extraordinary move was made when a medal was presented to the citizens of the Town of Milton.

His Excellency the Governor General, in his capacity as Chief Scout for Canada has granted the award of the Medal of Merit to the citizens of the Town of Milton. The award was formally presented on Sunday, Nov. 10 at the Milton Town Hall by the Provincial Commissioner, Mr. A. V. Denny.

The Medal of Merit is normally granted to individuals for "Good Services to Scouting." This presentation breaks this pattern by being the first time it has been made to a group of people.

The citizens of Milton quickly and cheerfully opened their hearts and homes to 2,500 Scouts and their leaders when a severe electrical and wind-storm wiped out part of the 1st Ontario Jamboree. Boy Scouts and their leaders from Stouffville and Claremont attended the Jamboree and later praised the co-operation and assistance rendered by service clubs and citizens within the town.
