Uxbridge ratepayers Urge attendance at meeting

UXBRIDGE — At a lengthy session of the Township of Uxbridge Ratepayers' executive committee this week, it was decided that with the Public Meeting on the proposed by-law controlling Gravel and Quarry operations scheduled for Monday, November 25, at 8:00 p.m. in the Goodwood Hall, it would be inopportune to hold another general meeting before the middle of January next year. Instead, they urge that all members of the Association and interested ratepayers turn out for the above meeting to ensure that the interests of the Township and its residents are both represented and protected. It is felt that this by-law, if passed, could have an effect both directly and indirectly on our future for many years to come, therefore, it is essential that any ratepayer who has an opinion on the subject should be there to express it. Looking forward to their next meeting in January, the executive decided that Mr. Earl Dowswell, a long time resident of the Township, should be officially approached and invited to address the meeting on the subject of Township Affairs. Mr. Dowswell has held several public offices, including Councillor and Reeve of Uxbridge Township, Warden of Ontario County and until quite recently, was a member of the Committee of Adjustment. His prowess as a public speaker is well known, therefore he should make the meeting a very interesting one. As Mr. Dowswell has already been unofficially approached on this subject, it is confidently expected that he will accept the invitation.

Bridge open to traffic

MARKHAM TWP. — The old Freeman bridge on Steeles Avenue, west of concession 9, Markham Township, has been replaced by a new span and the road is now open to traffic. The project was a joint venture by the Township of Markham and Scarborough. The contractor was Inverleigh Construction Company of Milton. Although the original estimate was for \$148,452, the job was completed for \$135,000.
