'Clippers' extend win streak to six

Pipher pots pair

STOUFFVILLE — The Clippers kept their victory string intact, registering their sixth win in as many starts.

In a close-checking contest against Keswick, Tuesday, the homesters came out on the top end of a 6-3 score.

Jerry Oatman's acrobatics in the Keswick cage was all that saved the game from becoming a rout. Several desperate lunges between the posts robbed the 'Clipper' sharpshooters of certain goals.

Although lacking some of its power the Clipper ship was by no means in trouble. Injuries however, to forwards Wolfgang Schlombes, Carl Keffer and Bob Hassard took some of the zip out of the Stouffville attack.

Ray Pipher played one of his best games of the season. He blinked the light twice. Playing his usually effective game, Art Rennick chalked up one goal and an assist.

It was two tallies per period and Bob McNeil led

off as he baffled Oatman with the help of Art Rennick and Don Haynes. Ray Pipher doubled the lead for Stouffville and Dan Pettit got the assist. The scoreboard flashed 2-1 after Glenn Jackson, who had a quiet night, watched a job shot of Danny Skletcher's trickle by.

Although short handed, the Clippers increased their lead after Art Rennick scored on a Bob McNeil pass. Then it was Don Haynes from Bob Smith and Al Patterson to add to Keswick's woes.

Pete Goodfellow got that one back after Ian Jones, minus a hockey stick, tried to defend against a two-man rush.

During the last frame, Pete Goodfellow kept Keswick within striking distance before Ken Aida countered less than sixty seconds later with assistance from Dan Pettit. It was all over at 14:36 when Ray Pipher took on Aida pass to make it 6-3 for the home team.
