Pickering seeks judge's order

ONTARIO CTY. — With only Deputy Reeve A. R. Chatten, Pickering Township voting in favor, County Council defeated a motion to instruct the county assessment department to make available the information required by the Pickering Township solicitor and consultant to fully determine the need to proceed with the township's appeal against the equalized assessment established by the county. Such documents were to include a sales to assessment ratio and mid-range factors.

Mr. Bob Attersley, White deputy-reeve told council he had met for two hours with Mr. Lettner, municipal consultant and the solicitor. The solicitor had pointed out a mandamus action brought by Pickering is to be heard Nov. 28 by the county judge. He advised against giving any information without a court order. It was revealed by Mr. Attersley that the council for Pickering Township had refused to supply cer-

tain papers requested by the county. Mr. Lettner did not feel that, under the act, certain information should be provided by the county. No assessor in the province would give out such details, he said. "We are trying to save money for the taxpayers. I see no reason why the facts we seek should not be revealed," Mr. Chatten said. Explaining why the Pickering Township equalization factor had gone up, Mr. Lettner said the rate

had remained the same while sales prices had increased substantially. In Scott Township, the factor had gone up due to reassessment. "I don't think the Ontario County Assessment Department has sufficient staff to take care of the reassessment of the whole county as fast as it should be done; but it is better than in most counties. After reassessment the present staff would be large enough to keep the work up to date."
