Peewees win thriller

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville Peewees have done it again. This time they won a cliff-hanger over Uxbridge by a score of 6-5.

Wayne Norton provided the dramatic moment when he broke the 5-5 deadlock with one minute and fifty seconds remaining in the game.

This club will bring a lot of hockey glory to Stouffville over the next few years if they stay together. During the past few weeks they have been showing that they possess the most important ingredients of success — power, balance and a winning attitude. Their most obvious strength is their ability to skate, a prerequisite of the highest order in hockey. Also they have scoring power that lies not with one or two superstars but with almost the entire front wall. Their forwards check as well as rush and their rearguards rush as well as check and in the nets they have a cool goalie rather than one of the hot and cold variety. This spells balance. Most important of all, they are willing to give that little

extra to be the winner. Perhaps a bit tired after a 9-0 victory over Pickering the previous night, the IGA's watched the Uxbridge crew score the first four goals before making their debut on the scoreboard. In such a situation, a mediocre team might lose heart, but not so with Stouffville's peewees. They came on strong to overcome the deficit and as a result of three goals in the final five minutes retained their undefeated record.

Tom Newton for Uxbridge carried his team by scoring four of the visitors' five goals. If there was a turning point in the game for Stouffville it was in the third period when Newton, who had dominated the play, received a penalty. The locals connected seconds later and then rapped home another pair before the final buzzer.

Don Campbell produced a stellar performance but some of the glory must be directed to Mike Whiteman who set up all three of Campbell's goals. Kevin Barrick also had a good night and was credited with two markers. For the losers, Bernie Aldred contributed a single.
