## Assessment data withheld by County

PICKERING TWP. — Pickering Twp. council will officially protest the way a motion was put through at the Ontario County council last week.

The motion was to release assessment information to the township's consultant and solicitor, who required the equalization work papers, assessment ratios and other factors to determine whether or not they would continue with their appeal against Pickering's allocation of assessment.

Reeve John Williams, describing the county meeting as the most "mixed up" one he ever attended, said they were within a hair's breadth of having the resolution passed when a suggestion of adjournment was made to meet again the following morning.

Although Williams protested, because he was obliged to be absent the next morning, adjournment was carried.

Deputy-reeve Ron Chal-

len present at the next morning's session, said a complete "snow job" was done on the township. He protested a motion to go into committee when an unresolved council motion was on the floor.

With a member of the assessment department present in committee, he said, they "put the fear of God into all council members in a motion that would have carried before."

"In my opinion," said Mr. Williams, "they were completely out of order to go to committee of the whole when there was a council motion on the floor."
