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Mrs. George Barkey Close link with town's history

STOUFFVILLE — The passing of Mrs. George Barkey, Dec. 2 has broken a strong family link with Stouffville's past. Mrs. Barkey, the former Alberta Stouffer, was the daughter of Christian Stouffer and Jane Macklem, native settlers here and from whom the village attained its original name.

Mrs. Barkey, 94, was extremely proud of her heritage. The Stouffer family coat of arms held a prominent place in the living room of her home, conc. 7, Whitchurch.

Born near Ringwood in 1874, only seven years after Confederation, Mrs. Barkey attended public schools at both Ringwood and Stouffville and later moved to the Stouffer homestead immediately north of the high school.

Mrs. Barkey loved to sing and was a member of the Stouffville Methodist Church choir. The family also played in the Stouffville Brass Band. Mr. Barkey passed away in 1959.

The Barkey farm in Whitchurch was her home ever since her marriage 60 years ago. It is operated by her son, Howard. Mrs. Barkey was very fond of art and a number of her own pictures were hung about the house. She was a member of Second Markham Baptist Church.

Mrs. Barkey was a lovely lady, both in personality and appearance. She enjoyed nothing more than sharing conversation with old friends who came to call. From the family of nine, only one brother, David, of Stouffville, survives. He is 88.

Service on Friday afternoon from the O'Neill Funeral Home, Stouffville, was conducted by Rev. Denis Gibson, assisted by Dr. W. S. Whitcombe with interment, Dickson's Hill Cemetery.
