

Councillors defend "freedom of speech"

PICKERING TWP. — For stating publicly that he would make a notice of motion to annex Pickering Village and Ajax, councillor Don Kitchen has been reprimanded by Reeve John Williams.

The remark was made following Minister of Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough's rejection of Pickering as a part of Metro.

The notice of motion was not made.

Said the Reeve: "I would like to have the opinion of this council as to whether each and every member of the council is acting in the best interest of the municipality by making policy and opinion statements outside the council."

Another statement which the reeve resented was one which he said implied that the City of Toronto is inward in its considerations — made by one of the councillors.

"It does not enhance our

position," he said. "If one of our members calls a municipality names or another makes rash statements of annexing this and that."

He believed that councillors have some serious responsibility to restrict the sphere of their activity in regard to freedom of expression.

"If it's the wish of this council that I be negotiator or go-between or message boy, then let's keep the peace until the time is ripe to lose our tempers and become angry," he said.

Mr. Williams suggested a meeting at which each could "speak his piece, including Wm. G. Newman, M.P.P., regarding his statement that Pickering should join Oshawa."

Councillor Don Kitchen countered that what did not go on the news was that he didn't think Pickering should take any uni-

lateral action. He said that no one has control of the press, nor should they have.

Councillor John Kruger observed that you would never be able to gag any member of a political body. He said the remark that was made with regard to annexation was made in the emotion of the moment.

Kruger said he often spoke to the press, and "unless I have that right I have no business sitting on council."

"I think this type of dialogue going on is how regional government will best be understood by the people," he said. "If anything is said or done to which a councillor feels he can respond, I think he has that right."

Mr. Kruger said that when you cut an individual to pieces, at that time you are wrong. If you cut his ideas to pieces — that is different."
