From the minister's study

We wanted off on the 10th floor of the high rise apartment building. We watched the neon numbers in the elevator move from one, two, three, and then my wife noticed that number thirteen was missing.

No need to ask why. Apartment owners know that most people in North America would not rent an apartment on the thirteenth floor. Thirteen is an unlucky number.

What puzzles me is the way up-to-date people smile at "those old superstitious Christians who believe the Bible. You know, all those stories about a man walking on water, even rising from the dead, and then entering a room without opening a door." These same people shy from the thirteenth floor. I wonder why!

The same people who were surrounded by a Christian atmosphere when they were children are embarrassed as they enter maturity. They are embarrassed because of the "intellectual suicide" involved in being a Christian. "After all, who could believe all that superstition in Christianity and still behave as a rational individual in 1969?" What has happened to all these former Sunday school kids who recited verse after verse for years? Why do they think as they do now?

Let me attempt to answer. They have gotten deeply involved in a world that seems unrelated to historic Christian faith. Years pass and the little out-of-context verses fade into the fog. If somebody happens to mention the Bible, the Church of Christ at this mature point, the response is a cynical smile and a negative shake of the head.

Are these people really honest with themselves? Do they think this way because they have investigated the whole strata of Christian belief? I doubt it. If every mature person in the modern world would dig into the true Christian teaching of the New Testament, the thirteenth floor wouldn't be a problem any more.
