Newt Joynt, that venerable sports promoter from Agincourt, is also on the executive.

Agincourt's Bill Collier is the 'daddy' of them all. He will be 89 on May 1. Not only does he bowl twice a week, he also plays shuffleboard and walks from 5 to 6 miles on weekends.


How do alley and lawn bowling compare? "Lawn bowling is by far the best game," says Andy Williams, "there's a lot more to it." many and many and a s

The majority of members have been in the league since its inception. Some, however, take a temporary leave of absence in mid-January to enjoy a trip to Florida but most attend regularly.


Here in Stouffville, the bowling alley is conveniently located near the firehall. There's nothing like winding up an afternoon of good-natured rivalry with a few games of euch-
