## Leads underwater search

**STOUFFVILLE** — On Saturday, members of the Canadian Sub-Aqua Club of Toronto will begin a search for a 500 pound boat propeller, submerged on the bottom of Lake Muskoka near Crawford Island. Charles Jones, Elm Road, Stouffville, a member of the divers' organization, will lead the underwater party. They hope to raise the propeller, Feb. 16.

It is believed that the prop, measuring about five feet across, was lost from an early lake steamer over 50 years ago. The water is thirty feet deep at the point where the propeller is known to be resting. Considerable care will be required to raise it since the east iron unit is very brittle. The prop will be scraped in an effort to learn the identity of the ship that lost it.

Club members will be transported to the site by snowmobile. A hole will be cut in the ice and cables lowered to the lake bottom. Once attached, the propeller will be raised by winch.
