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How To Conduct Yourself In An Accident



Lack of first aid training is like not having a seat belt in your car. You don't miss it until you need it and then it's too late.

What is even worse than lack of first aid knowledge, however, is the harm done by well-meaning persons to accident victims in the mistaken belief they are helping them.

One of the first "don'ts" listed by the Red Cross for citizens lending a hand at automobile accidents is — "Don't move an injury victim unless it is absolutely necessary." If the victim has to be moved, then don't roll or twist the body. Pull by the head or feet while a second person supports the other end of the body. This will avoid aggravating internal injury.

Shock almost always follows injury and the best procedure is to keep the victim comfortable and warm. If bones are broken, DON'T move the limbs involved while you await the arrival of an ambulance.

Bleeding should be stopped with a clean cloth pad and burns should be protected from the air by the same method to lessen pain. Head injuries often bring unconsciousness and the victim should be kept quiet and lying down. If the victim isn't breathing, artificial respiration is necessary immediately.

Observance of these simple procedures until medical help arrives can save a lot of suffering and perhaps even a life.
