Don't Let Your Eyes Fool You



As the old saying goes - "Seeing is believing" - and it was never more true, or vital, than when

you're driving. The armed forces, universities and industry researchers working on cutting down accidents say it is the way many drivers use their eyes that causes them to "miss seeing" oncoming vehicles. You may have had the experience yourself

while pulling out from a parking space, or passing an intersection. Suddenly, as if out of nowhere, another car is just THERE. You thought you looked and yet saw nothing. Your eyes momentarily fooled

What happens in such cases is that we use too much of our "peripheral" or side vision instead of looking at the source of danger directly through our clear central vision. Look directly, left to right, and through the rear view mirror for rear approaches when caution de-

mands it. It's sound practise, too, to keep your eyes moving, especially at night when they have a tendency to stare. And sight beyond the headlights for shapes if the visibility is poor. And next to your own eyes, watch the eyes of pedestrians and other drivers. They're keys to where they might move

Safety checks show that almost thirty percent of all headlights are improperly aimed, resulting in strain to oncoming cars and reduced vision for the driver. If you are in doubt about your lights, bring your car in for a check. If they need reaiming, the charge is very nominal.


