Juveniles win first playoff series

STOUFFVILLE — The rejuvenated Stouffville juveniles never looked better than they did last Friday night in Woodbridge. They emerged the victors by 5-1 to climax the best-of-five series in three straight games. It was a decisive series in that the Stouffville squad outscored the opposition by fourteen goals to four.

Stouffville's tenacious checking was the technical highlight of the final game. It was so effective that the losers were unable to get untracked and pose for any positive threat. Such was their frustration that elbows, knees and wayward sticks became weapons of retaliation. Coupled with several questionable calls by the officials Stouffville's crew held its temper extremely well and personal battles gave way to the greater cause — team victory.

The game's outcome was the result of an all-out team effort and only a few members rose above the general level of good play. One was Wally Crowder, whose alert moves in the final period kept the opposition's triggermen shaking their heads. Wayne Jackson's two goals and one assist made him the most productive forward of the game and series.

The winners collected a pair of markers in the first period. Jackson was credited with both. Bill Thornhill set up the first and Dave Farlow and Thornhill structured the second.

Stouffville added two more goals in the second stanza. Ray Paisley scored from Gord Henderson and then Henderson was aided by Wayne Emmerson to make it 4-0. Woodbridge stirred when Brian Ross beat Crowder.

Stouffville's last goal came in the third period after Farlow and Thornhill fed a pass to Jackson.

Coach Harman's big chore now is to keep the team's spirit alive while awaiting the second round of playoffs which are expected to commence in two weeks.
