Question 3-

In Canada most people want to own their own house, preferably completely detached, surrounded by some green lawn. More people in Canada own their own home than, on the average, in any other county. Yet some town planners and economists tell us that we pay heavily for this passion for home ownership. It ties up an enormous amount of capital which might otherwise be used for the development of our untapped resources. It may be a poor investment for the individual in comparison with what comparable equity investment would bring. It hinders the mobility of labour which will be required by a society transformed by automation and industrial change. It imposes on government heavy expenditures on schools, roads, services and other utilities which must be shouldered by tax payers as a whole.

These experts suggest we should persuade more of the public to live in rented accommodation, and establish higher density, high rise accommodation rather than a suburbia of self-contained owner houses. But, without doubt, most people wish to own their own homes.

Do you agree that government should try and enable every family in Canada to own its own home?


