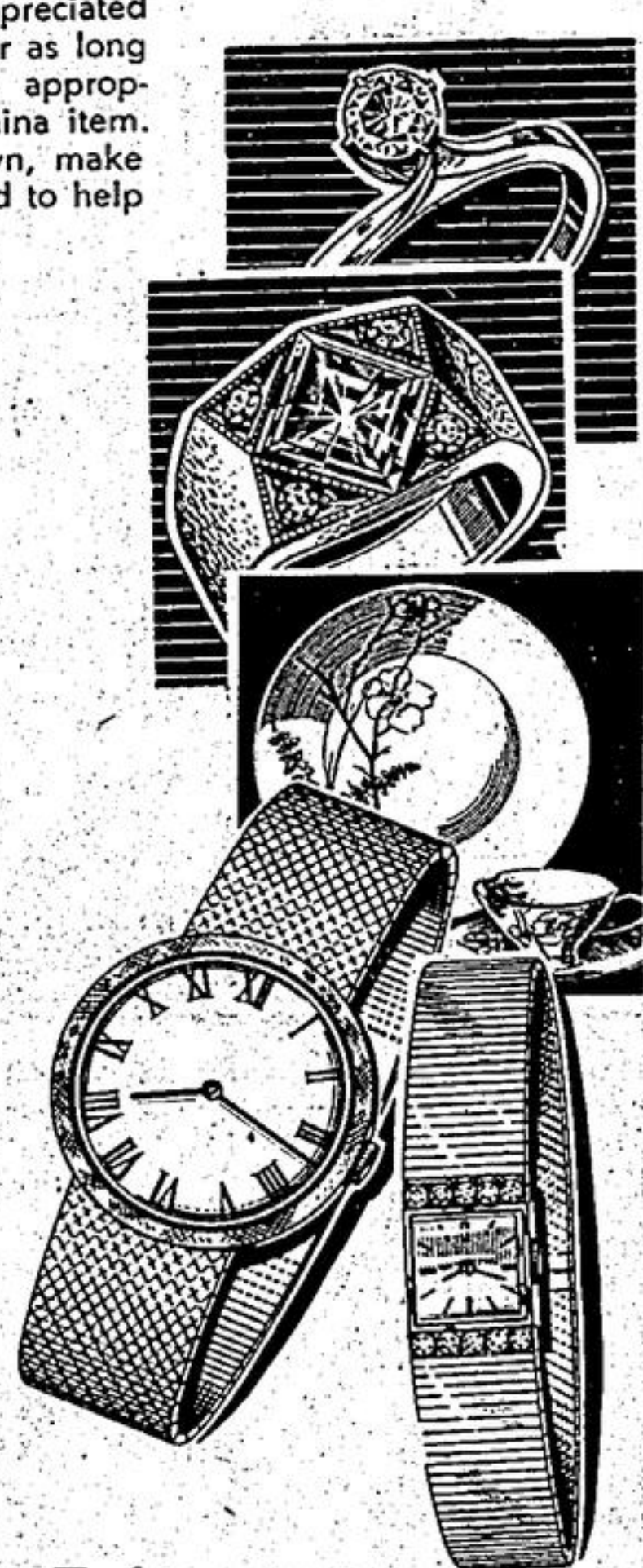
Brother and sister duet wins awards
